FIVE DENOMINATIONS CO-OPERATE IN MOVE FOR INCREASED ZEAL

Premier E. C. Drury One of the Chief Speakers.

CONVENE IN TORONTO

Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, Congregationalists Foregather.

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—A convention of unusual interest was opened in Massey Hall here tonight when five religious denominations, Anglicans, Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians and Congregationalists, began an ambitious plan for increased membership, increased zeal and increased financial resources. These five denominations are also acting in co-operation to set before the Canadian people the relation of religion to patriotism.

Principal Gaudier of Knox College, presided. He declared at the outset that the movement was not one for church union. "It is not a merger of any kind," he said. "It is an inter-church move to arouse the nation by united efforts and to fulfill the mission of Jesus Christ on earth."

Hon. E. C. Drury, premier of Ontario, was one of the chief speakers. He said in part: "This movement is fraught with very great possibilities. It is in the first place more or less an acknowledgment of failure to do their duty on the part of the churches. It is more or less an acknowledgment that we have not done everything that we might have done in the service of Christ."

Some justification. "And when we look back over the years we find there has been some justification for that idea that the church has failed of her mission. As I see it, that failure has been due to the lack of organization, the lack of machinery, the lack of putting first things first, the lack of first of all putting Christ as the centre of all Christian service. We have perhaps looked too much for other things to work the world's salvation—political reform, social service, ethics and philosophy."

"This movement, I take it, is a movement to get together and sink into essential things out of sight and emphasize the one big thing. I take it as an acknowledgment on our part that we are going to get back to the only thing that can save the world, and that is belief in Jesus Christ."

"I am, indeed, happy tonight to be here, not to make a speech, because a great many things forbid me making a speech. It would not be seemly for me to make a speech before this gathering tonight. I am here to express my thorough accord, my oneness with this movement, which promises to do such great things for Christianity and for Canada."

The Only Thing. "I believe this movement must be fraught with blessing to the Christian church in Canada and to Canada. Because, after all, Christianity is the only thing to which we can look for any real good. And the Christians and the Christian church are the only forces that we can look to today for anything more or less accessories."

No Reply Yet From Mexico to U.S. Note

Texas Report, However, Says Mexican Govt. Has Decided To Reply.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—There was no word today from the Mexican Government in answer to the sharp note from the state department demanding the immediate release of William O. Jenkins, American consular agent at Puebla.

All day officials waited for a note which they thought might be handed to them by the Mexican embassy here, in view of the reports on Sunday night that a long dispatch relating to the Jenkins case had reached the embassy from Mexico City.

But there was no reply and not even an intimation that the Mexican Government had prepared its answer. So far as the state department was able to learn, Jenkins still was sick and in the Mexican penitentiary on charges that he had conspired with rebel bandits who kidnapped him and forced him to pay a ransom of approximately \$150,000.

President Carranza has found the situation to be so acute that he has returned to Mexico City from Queretaro to take part in the consideration of the Jenkins case, reports today said.

BOLSHEVIKI TO MAKE KOLCHAK A PEACE OFFER

New Russian Government Projected With Moderates Represented.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—A German wireless dispatch received here says that the Russian Bolshevik paper, Pravda of Moscow, announces that a new Russian Government is projected in which the Mensheviks (moderates) will participate; that a peace offer is to be sent to Admiral Kolchak and Gen. Denikin, and that Nikolai Lenin, the Bolshevik premier, intends to convene a national assembly in Moscow.

Wireless Telephones For North Manitoba To Be Recommended

WINNIPEG, Nov. 24.—The establishment of a wireless telephone system throughout the settlements in Northern Manitoba, at an estimated cost of from \$25,000 to \$30,000, will be recommended by Professor R. C. Wallace, commissioner for this territory. Hon. Edward Brown announced today. Professor Wallace has been at work for some time on this proposition and will probably make his recommendations in the near future.

CAN. GOVERNMENT DELEGATES TO VOTE FOR EIGHT-HOUR DAY AT LABOR CONFERENCE

N. W. Rowell States Position of the Government.

Representative of Canadian Employers Voices Their Oppositon.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 24.—(By state correspondent Canadian Press, Limited).—Canadian Government delegates will vote for the proposed convention on the eight-hour day. At the international labor conference this afternoon, Hon. Newton Wesley Rowell clearly and unequivocally stated the position of the Dominion Government.

S. R. Parsons, Canadian employers' delegate, had read a statement giving the Canadian employers' view.

"Mr. Parsons," Mr. Rowell said, "has very properly presented the views of the employers, but in the last analysis the governments in the different countries of the world must determine the policy of the country, and my colleagues and I, representing the Government of Canada, intend voting for this convention."

Mr. Rowell's declaration was loudly applauded.

He are, however," Mr. Rowell went on, "some suggestions which we may wish to make with reference to the form of some of the sections, which we shall do when they come up for consideration."

Canada Independent. "And I wish to say further that while we appreciate the difficulties of the United States possibly adopting the policy and Canada adopting the other, the action of the Government of Canada does not depend on the action of the Government of the United States in dealing with these matters. It has not in the past. It will not in the future. It will be a consideration under, which any government must take into account."

The Parliament of Canada has already approved the treaty containing the labor clause and the league of nations covenant. We think the league of nations and the labor clause constitute two of the most vital and important features of the whole treaty.

The Parliament of Canada having approved the league of nations and the labor clause, the Government of Canada will carry out the obligations it has assumed in the treaty, in spirit as well as in the letter."

Employers Opposed. The eight-hour day convention was before the conference throughout the afternoon, Mr. Parsons declaring that he was speaking for Canadian employers, "many of whom have been consulted since this conference was in session. It is a general application of the shorter working day world, in his opinion, lessen total production, and only by increased production could the cost of living be reduced to all classes."

unsuccessful attempt had been made. Mr. Parsons went on to include commercial undertakings in the eight-hour day convention, and some countries had included agriculture in proposed legislation of this class. "Evidently," Mr. Parsons declared, "what is aimed at ultimately is an attempt to drive all of the workers of the world, like a flock of sheep, into the eight-hour pen, regardless of requirements. Nor is it suggested for a moment that acceptance of the eight-hour day would permanently settle social and industrial problems, including the hours of work."

Get Into Politics. Under the proposed legislation governments would be called upon to deal not only with economic questions, but also with political questions. It was quite conceivable that "influence" would be brought to bear upon politicians. This would not make for national soundness and prosperity. There was much truth in the statement that government is best which governs least."

Mr. Parsons referred to the Ottawa industrial conference. There, he said, employers had asked for reference on the eight-hour question to a special commission, which would be determined by the eight-hour day for Canada was economically sound, he had no doubt employers would be glad to co-operate in bringing it into being. But Mr. Parsons added, unless the United States accepted similar legislation, the terms of the proposed convention would place an unfair burden on Canadian employers.

At the conclusion of the statement, Mr. Barnes, British Government delegate, "reminiscent" Mr. Parsons that all signatories of the peace treaty had agreed to nine principles, included among which were the eight-hour day and 48-hour week. Indeed, the general principle of the eight-hour day had been woven throughout the week's general discussion by the conference. The question now before the conference was the discussion of the convention clause by amendment.

H. Warrington Smith, delegate from the South African Government, moved an amendment to the convention referring the application of the eight-hour day so far as workers engaged in transport or inland waterways were concerned, to the special committee which is investigating application of the eight-hour day to seamen. Mr. Rowell spoke in favor of the amendment. Seamen engaged in navigation of inland waters, he submitted, should stand in the same relation as those engaged in ocean navigation. The amendment was carried.

Mr. Crawford, workers' delegate from South Africa, moved an amendment to make the convention apply to industrial work done in the home. The question, Mr. Crawford said, was whether the convention for recognition or "sweating" should be upon the conference. As it stood the convention was not applicable to work in which only members of the family were employed. The inclusion of these words in the convention, Mr. Crawford announced, was an encouragement to sweating. What was the use of shortening hours in the factories, he asked, if the workers were to be exhausted by working long hours in unhealthy abodes?

An amendment by Gino Baldesi, Italian workers' delegate, that "no decrease in wages by day or by week can be admitted by the workers," was declared out of order. The conference adjourned until tomorrow morning.

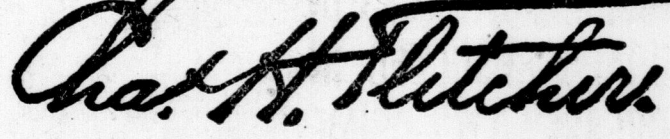

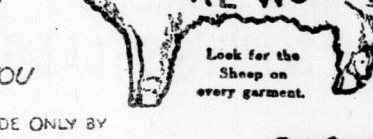
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
