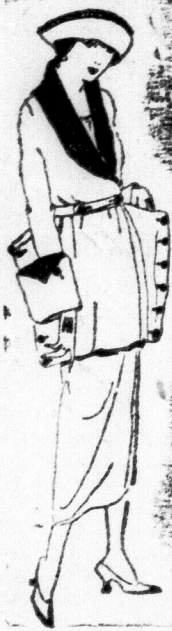

A BIG GIRL GUIDE

Will Be Held On the Western
University Grounds—
Church Parade.

Plans for the big Girl Guide rally to be held at the Western University grounds on Saturday, June 19, were made at a meeting of the local Girl Guide executive held at the Y. W. C. A. residence, King Street, yesterday morning. Mrs. F. C. Betts, the local commissioner, was in the chair.

This rally will take the form of a great garden party with program of guide work put on by the various companies in the city, and as there are over 250 guides in all, it is expected that something very fine will be given, including a grand march of all the guides in their uniforms. One of the important features of the occasion will be the giving out of the laundry badges, won at the recent laundry tests. There will also be samples of the work done by local guides.

During the afternoon a tea room will be conducted, with Mrs. C. R. Somerville and Mrs. Westland in charge, and an ice cream social will be given by Mrs. Harper as convener. Mrs. Harry Carling was appointed to be in charge of the lunch and refreshments, and Mrs. C. About Eggs.
An average egg yields about seventy-five calories. It is a very important article of diet, not only because of its great nutritive value, its easy digestibility and palatability, but because of the variety of ways in which it may be served. But eggs should be fresh, and clean. If it is necessary to use stored eggs, they can at least be good. Eggs do not deteriorate quickly, if they are properly cared for. They should be kept in a cold, dry place, free from contact with foods of strong odors, because they are quickly tainted through their porous shells.

riest to the top, it is completely spoiled. When an egg is broken, it is as good as lost. The yolk is round, firm, smooth and shiny, and the white is clear and clinging round the yolk. If the yolk flattens or breaks, or if the white is dull and thin and watery, the egg is stale. It is difficult to beat the white of a stale egg stiff and dry. Eggs are most plentiful in spring and may then be preserved for use in the winter. If placed in proper storage while fresh they may be kept for some months. There are few people with whom eggs disagree, and they are most important in the diet for both the sick and the well.
