

CALLED TO VOTE FOR EMPIRE UNITY

Municipal Chapter, I.O.E.,
Hears Address on Ideal
Organization.

FORMS NEW CHAPTER

Sherbourne Club Branch Will
Be Composed of Business
Women.

At the regular monthly meeting of Toronto Municipal Chapter, of the I. O. E. D., which took place yesterday, at the Sherbourne Club, Miss Constance Bouton gave a stirring and patriotic address upon the unity and ideal of organized women. In such a wonderful organization as that of the Daughters of the Empire, she said, whose membership stretched from sea to sea there was no one ideal, the unity of the British Empire, and the united daughters of the empire must see to it that this empire should remain united forever. It was their privilege to use the vote to the level of voting on party lines.

Canadian women, the speaker continued, were among the best in the world. It was for this reason that they had got the vote, because by reason of the vote they were ready for it, and one of the biggest of these ready of organized women was the I. O. E. D.

Referring to recent victories of our Canadian troops in France, Miss Bouton said she often wondered what had become of the enthusiasm which was shown during the days of the war, over victories which were put in the local as compared with those of today, when men are fighting for the peace of the entire world. The most wonderful things are going on today, and the majority of us appear to be completely indifferent to them. Surely the fire of the defeated suffering of Belgium and other countries is still burning in our hearts, and more ready for service. She had been proud to tell in New York how the Daughters of the Empire had started out to care for a few hundreds of wives of soldiers, and were now looking after 10,000. For heaven's sake, she urged, let us stop striving over petty things and stand free to take up the big things which may and must come upon us with the vote, and as a result of the war.

Loyalty in individuals to their chapters and to each other would lead to loyalty to their country, and thus would be realized justice, honor and peace for the whole empire.

The Great Peace League.—There has been some talk in the United States about peace leagues. The emblem of the biggest peace league in the world was the Union Jack, and its president was King George V, the most imperial domestic, aristocratic and constitutional of any monarch who has ever come to the throne. His democracy is shown through his speech, and they must remember that he was not placed head of the empire by any party politics, but was there to hold all parties in complete unity. Ex-President Taft, of the United States, had a magnificent speech in tribute to the British Empire when he acknowledged that as a result of the war of imperialism he had found the greatest in Great Britain. In conclusion, Miss Bouton reminded those present that the Daughters of the Empire had started out to care for a few hundreds of wives of soldiers, and were now looking after 10,000. For heaven's sake, she urged, let us stop striving over petty things and stand free to take up the big things which may and must come upon us with the vote, and as a result of the war.

Body of Toronto Woman Found in Welland Canal

Chief of Police Laing of Welland reported by telegram to the local detective department yesterday afternoon that the body of an unknown woman, but believed to hail from Toronto, was found in the Welland Canal Thursday night. She is about 30 years of age, is 5 feet 7 inches in height, weighs about 160 pounds, has brown hair, and was clad in a green corduroy suit, bronze or purple high boots, size five, and upon one of her fingers was a gold ring set originally with five pearls, but now with one missing. Engraved on the inside of the ring are the initials "M. C." and the jeweler's number is 3070124.

According to Inspector of Detectives Kennedy there is no report of a missing woman of this description in police records here.

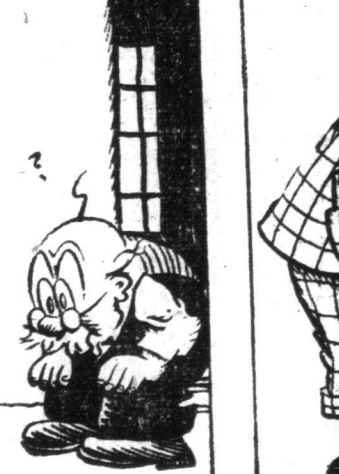
