

COMMUNITY WORK HELPED THOUSANDS

Many Pathetic Cases Revealed in Connection With Service Campaign.

Some pathetic cases in the city are revealed by the Neighborhood Workers' Association in connection with the drive of the Federation for Community Service to raise \$450,000, Nov. 20, and the first three days of December. Practically all of the unfortunate ones were victims of the late war and peculiar circumstances, and forced down to accept charity thru no fault of their own.

All of the forty-eight institutions in the federation have heart-touching histories of their own and the federation, in undertaking the financial drive, will relieve each organization of conducting separate campaigns, and leave them to devote their energies to the definite work in hand.

The combined reports of the charities show that thousands of people were helped last year. Money was not everything. Poor unfortunate needed the helping hand of sympathetic workers not given to condemning because they had transgressed the laws of society. Trained nurses paid 41,000 visits; 4,573 poor people were nursed; care to babies and poor children aggregated 35,228 in number; 1,356 delinquent boys and girls were helped; 237 aged men and women were given assistance, and in many cases homes; 5,739 poor people in distress were relieved; 684 young women needed help, were given it; 101,300 girls came under the direction of the institutions last year and were furnished rest rooms and provided meals.

The federation is an organization of perfect union. The Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions, Gyro, Knights of Columbus, young men of the board of trade and all institutions concerned have organized teams and for the four days of the drive will canvass the entire city, which, for efficiency, has been divided into six districts.

The suggestion has been made by Assessment Commissioner Forman that the city could relieve the housing situation by making loans to builders up to about 75 per cent. of the value of the property. His views are contained in a report on Aid. Ryding's motion to exempt new buildings from taxation for three years.

The trouble at present appears to be largely due to the unwillingness of loan companies to advance satisfactory loans to builders. Private capital is being looked to, but it seems that even from this source, with the large rate of interest demanded, a sufficient per cent. of loan on the cost of the building is not being made. It has been impressed upon me that if the builder could get a 75 per cent. loan on the cost of the land and building, or even the building, the present housing situation would be greatly relieved.

"Such a percentage of loan is not now possible unless the city, or possibly some of our philanthropists or capitalists, come to the rescue and, under proper restrictions to protect their interests, assume such responsibility."

Mr. Forman does not approve of the three-year tax exemption idea.

COOKERY COLUMN

COCOA SPONGE CAKE

1/2 cup Cowan's Cocoa
4 tablespoons hot water
3 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup pastry flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Beat egg yolks until thick and creamy. Add sugar gradually, beating all the time. Add lemon rind and juice. Add whites of eggs beaten stiff. Mix flour, baking powder, cocoa and salt together, sift three times. Fold in above mixture. Bake in a greased and floured pan 40-50 minutes in a slow oven.

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ASK PARK TRANSFERRED TO EXHIBITION BOARD

A suggestion has been sent to the board of control by George J. Castle that Exhibition Park and buildings should be transferred to the Exhibition board, under an agreement reserving the use of the grounds for park purposes except on certain dates. He figures that a large revenue could be obtained from the buildings which now stand idle almost fifty weeks of the year. It is suggested that the ground inside the track should be graded and used for football matches and other games.

MILK COMMITTEE TO ENGAGE EXPERT

City Will Ask Permissive Legislation to Go Into the Business.

The special milk committee of the board of health decided yesterday to engage Dr. Charles E. North of New York City, an expert on milk distribution, to come to Toronto and make a survey of the milk situation here and advise on the question of establishing a municipal milk service in the city.

Council two weeks ago authorized the committee to engage Dr. North and voted a thousand dollars towards the cost. A letter from Dr. North, read at the meeting yesterday, said that his fee for two weeks' work would be \$1,300 and expenses. He will be accompanied by his secretary and his chief engineer. They will arrive in Toronto about Dec. 6.

On the suggestion of Dr. Risk, chairman of the committee, they appeared before the committee on legislation and asked that permissive legislation be obtained to enable the city to go into the milk business. An amendment to the milk act, fixing the penalty at \$5 to \$500, instead of \$1 to \$50, is desired by Dr. Hastings. The offence he considers is sufficiently enormous to warrant a severe penalty. In cases recently before the court the milk showed only 2.4 to 2.6 instead of 3.25 of butter fat.

Will Seek Legislation. The committee on legislation yesterday decided to ask for permissive legislation to enable the city to go into the milk business. This action was taken at the request of the special milk committee of the board of health.

WILL ASK TENDERS FOR UNFINISHED SHIPS

Word was received by Thos. Foster, M.P., yesterday, that the Dominion government will call for tenders for the completion of the two ships now on the ways at the Dominion ship-building yards.

"The minister states that the opposition would think it was an unfair method of dealing with things if we handed the completion of the work over to an organization," said Mr. Foster.

Altho Mayor Church, as a representative of the city, has the right to attend directors' meetings of the Gas Company, he announces that he was not at the meeting which recently decided to increase the gas rates. The mayor again announces that he has no control over gas rates.

CISHOLM WILL ACT AS FUEL CONTROLLER

Commissioner Chisholm of the property department will act as fuel controller again this winter, as he has in the last two winters. His duties consist chiefly in looking after needy cases such as houses where sickness exists. The commissioner thinks the situation will not be as severe this winter as in the past two years.

NEW PROVINCIAL OFFICERS. Strengthening and reorganization of the provincial police is being rushed, and yesterday it was announced that the new officers had been assigned to the following places: Chatham, Dunnville, London, Cornwall, Kitchener, St. Catharines, Brockville, Guelph, Pembroke, Woodstock, Simcoe, Belleville, St. Thomas, Walkerville, Peterboro.

Another school of instruction for recruits to the force will be opened in a few days.

Superintendent Rogers declined to give out the names of the new officers.

TORONTO WOMAN'S WILL. Real estate in Saskatchewan, \$3,000; an equity in No. 597 Dufferin street, Toronto, \$2,750; household goods and furniture, \$450; cash in bank, \$1,749.51, and \$103, secured by agreement for sale comprise the estate of the late Georgina B. Taylor, of Toronto, who died on September 14, 1920. She bequeathed \$300 to her son, William L., \$800 and a piano to her daughter, Ella E. A. Emrick, and \$200 to Florence Manzie. The real estate goes to her son, Lloyd E. Taylor.

DRIVER'S PRACTICAL JOKE. "The fools are evidently not all dead yet," said Judge Coatsworth yesterday as he acquitted Amos North, a driver for the Canadian Express Co., who was alleged to have stolen an emerald stole from the Dominion Express Co. North said that he had no intention of stealing the fur, and had taken it from the other driver's wagon for a joke. "And like most practical jokes, it was entirely inexcusable," said the judge.

DIRECTOR OF CONSERVATION. The appointment of a director of conservation is under consideration by the Drury government. The forest and mineral wealth of the province and the water power resources would come under his jurisdiction. If appointed, he would be directly under the prime minister.

WOMAN GETS ALIMONY. On consent, Chief Justice R. M. Meredith yesterday gave judgment awarding Mrs. Margaret Eugenie Dora Leach alimony at the rate of \$50 a month against James Emmaney Leach.
