backing, that it can get money for 3 per cent, where at New York they have to pay from 5 to 10 per cent.

Mr. Brodeur declared that the government intended to carry on the work of improving the St. Lawrence channel with as much vigor as the improvement of this port, not only to afford the necessary accommodations for the big vessels, but to secure a reduction in the insurance discrimination, which at present so much affected the Canadian shipping trade, being here 25 cents per hundred dollars as compared with 12 1-2 from New York. When the programme of the government was carried out he considered that there would no longer be any excuse for that discrimination, against which the Canadian shipping interests had fought in vain. As a result of what had been already accomplished during the whole of last year the accidents between Montreal and Quebec had not amounted to \$1,000—a record of which the Canadian public might justly be proud.
