### WHY CONSCRIPTION?

(From New Brunswick Committee.)  
The war was raging in Europe. Ver-  
dun had just begun. The little wim-  
py man with black wax pointed mus-  
taches from "la Belle France" was vis-  
iting in "Angleterre" and talking to  
his friend, an English squire. A bat-  
talion of "Kitchener's Army" was march-  
ing back to billets after a "field day"  
on the heath nearby.

"What a fine body of men," quoth  
the Englishman, "and all raised under  
our voluntary system." "A proud boast

"I have heard that statement made so  
often during my few days in your won-  
derful country," replied the Frenchman,  
"that I believe it is worth my while to  
compare for a few moments the sys-  
tems that prevail in our respective  
countries, and I believe, in your Eng-  
lish fairness, you will admit that I am  
right."

"Firstly—I will admit that it would  
be a proud thing indeed if a country  
could rely upon its volunteer armies for  
its defense. In your case, a volunteer  
army in due time could be raised, equip-  
ped and trained. There would be very  
few if the country opposing us were  
also at the beginning of hostilities with-  
out an army; but when the opposing  
people have a trained standing army,  
and every male subject has at one time  
been a trained soldier, the proposition  
is not so fine. Let us look back at the  
beginning of the present war, for in-  
stance.

"Out of a clear sky, war breaks with  
its thunder of cannon and lightning of  
bursting shells. A few millions of  
armed and trained men swoop down on  
an unprepared country. Where would  
you have been in England, with your  
untrained and undisciplined hordes of  
civilians? Experience has told you that  
it takes months to train a man fit for  
battle. Before you could catch your  
breath, your country would be overrun,  
and your liberties blotted out forever.

"You did not believe you would ever  
need an army—you relied upon the  
navy alone. You were wrong. France  
saw the German menace and prepared  
Her army saved Britain, while the British  
navy saved France. Had Britain had  
a reasonably prepared army, or

had all her men had a militia training,  
the Huns would have been kept mov-  
ing on the dash back to the Marne, and  
could not have stopped to dig in until  
upon their own territory. If the  
fighting had for the last few months  
been going on in Germany instead of  
in Belgium and France, think of the  
moral effect upon the German people.  
But not your civilian hordes were not  
ready. We had to stop in our pursuit;  
they dug in, and now many lives and  
many pounds must be used and many  
months must elapse before they are  
pushed back to Hunland—where they  
might have been driven if England had  
a few years ago adopted universal train-  
ing and been able to throw into the  
fight a few hundred thousand men.

"Then stop for a moment to consider  
that you are sending partly trained men  
over to fight men who have trained for  
years. It stands to reason that these  
brave fellows are no match for the men  
skilled in war as the game is played to-  
day in its Hunland—where they  
might have been driven if England had  
a few years ago adopted universal train-  
ing and been able to throw into the  
fight a few hundred thousand men.

"My host calls me. I must away for  
now. I will be back again tomorrow  
and give you a few more reasons "Why  
Conscription?"
