

He is a son of John Pitblado, formerly granager of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Fredericton, and now a well known broker of Montreal. Lieut. Pitblado was born twenty-two years ago.

Gunner Ainsley Hicks, of Jolicure, who was wounded by a fragment of shell while fighting recently in France, was the first man recruited in Moncton who received wounds in action. He enlisted with Major Anderson's battery. After spending a short time in the hospital Gunner Hicks was able to return to the fixing line.

Sergeant Fred Campbell, who left Woodstock with the Brighton Engineers, after resigning a lucrative position in the United States, was struck on the side by a piece of shrapnel shell at Neuve Chappelle, and has been removed from the firing line to the Royal Victoria Hospital, Southampton, Eng.
