GRAND ART GALLERY AT ST. JOHN FAIR

Vigorous Committee Co-operating With Art Clubs All Over

On a few isolated occasions the people of St. John and New Brunswick generally have been favored with quite extensive displays of art works and numerous valuable canvases have been brought to these parts. During the ten days of Dominion Exhibition—September 5 to 15—the St. John Art Club, supported by the Exhibition Executive, will hold an Art Loan show of unusual excellence. This gallery is to be situated in a large portion of the new building adjoining the main structure and before the final arrangements were made a guarantee of over fifty magnificent paintings was secured from the Art Union of London, as well as assurances from connoisseurs in the large Canadian centres, that over one hundred rare works would be forthcoming in addition. The Maritime Provinces will contribute many more pictures, plastic art works, bronzes, rare art fabrics, etc., as well as an exclusive collection of ceramics, generous money allotment has been made to fit up the art gallery under the direction of an expert gallery superintendent, and those who enjoy graphic and applied art works will be assured of some rare delight at the St. John fair. Among those who will lend some of their choicest treasures will be Sir William Van Horne of Montreal.

IS FIFTY PER CENT. CHEAPER

James Carleton Throws More Light on Paving

WAS BEGUN RIGHT

But Contractors Soon Changed to Cheap Material—Why Was Sample of Original Not Dug Up?

St. John, N. B., July 29. Sir—Allow me to state a few facts in re Main street paving contract.

First—At the meeting of the Board of Works, held on Tuesday last, it was noted as saying that the specimens shown on tables in City Hall was good concrete, that is not the case, I stated they were fair specimens of grouted work, and inferior concrete.

Second—That the mode of laying the foundation for the paving is defective, and in no way meets the requirements of specification.

Third—That the specimens shown will not compare with that portion of foundation laid directly front of the cold storage building, which foundation was mixed and placed according to specification for the whole work, excepting that it was only 4 inches thick in spots instead of 6 inches as called for. Even this part is not up to the strength required by said specification, by reason of gravel being used instead of broken stone not larger than two inches, which makes the strongest concrete.

In showing the samples of Hasnam pavement to the Board of Works meeting, it would have been fair to me and to the citizens that a sample of the proprietary mixed concrete should have been placed with the other and the strength of each compared.

In conclusion, I would respectfully state that in my opinion the foundation placed by the Hasnam system costs fifty per cent more than called for in the specification. Thanking you for your valuable space, Yours truly, JAMES CARLETON.

TICKET SELLER TRIED 'FLIM-FLAM'

John Neilson, of South Wharf, Discovered His Loss of \$25 in Time and Detective Killed Got it Back

One of the "gentlemen" ticket sellers yesterday at Howe's circus attempted to perform a unique piece of sleight-of-hand work on John Neilson, of South wharf, and was for a time successful in securing the sum of \$25 through his manoeuvres, but in the end, the money was restored to the ticket seller, who had promised him a free seat if he would exchange the money. In return for the forty, the visitor to the circus received six five dollar notes, and nine ones, making thirty-nine dollars, which he was supposed to take in exchange for his forty.

He immediately informed the ticket seller of his "mistake," and that personage took back the money, counted it, and putting his hand into his pocket, begged pardon profusely, and tendered Mr. Neilson two half dollar pieces to make amends. He then rolled up the bills and giving them to their owner the latter put them away in his pocket. Mr. Neilson, when he got out of sight counted the roll, and found that there were five of the \$5 notes missing from the bottom, and he at once suspected that the talkative ticket seller had "palmed" the bills, when he reached into his pocket for the silver. Detective Killen was informed of the matter, and was not long in having the money restored to its proper owner, the excuse on the part of the circus man from whom he got it, being that he had picked it up in the grass, but strange to say, that while the money was the same as regards figures, namely \$25, the denomination of the notes was decidedly different.
