servation of game and the observance
of game laws and regulations. All

the camp life, the pipe and the stories.

**Arena Card Arousing Consider-
able Speculation Among
the Fans.**

A complete programme for the box-
ing at the Arena a week from tonight
has been issued and already the fans
are exhibiting lively interest in the
bouts and discussing the chances of
Gordon Paris, the local colored boy,
to lift the Maritime welterweight title,
which Henry of Halifax holds.

That Paris is a clever youngster
and has an even chance to bring the
title to his own city is admitted as he
put up several fine scraps here, notably
one with Johnny MacIntyre, former
champion, here. Paris with everything but
his fists, yet the local boy absorbed it all
and gave back plenty in return. The
peppery Healey will have his hands
full with Paris the moment the gong
sounds. If Paris does win, it will be
the first time in a great many years
that a local youth has held the welter-
weight title and as an incentive, Paris
will be matched with Johnny MacIntyre
about the middle of next month.

There will be two good preliminaries
—the first one being when Joe Irvine
will meet "Machine Gun" Smith, both
well known local boys. This pair can
always be depended on to give the fans
several thrills. They met here when
Paris boxed MacIntyre last winter and
Smith won handily. Joe is out for a
"clean-up" this time. Smith himself
is anxious to get back into the running
in view of a kayo at the hands of Paris
he quite recently. The second pre-
liminary will be between John Sullivan
and Jack Keefe. This will be for six
2-minute rounds, while the first
preliminary will be for eight 3-minute
rounds.

The Arena management announce

rope barriers around the ring instead
