Spring underwear is the laggard in the knit goods trade, and there appears no prospect of substantial betterment until price schedules are reduced. Early purchase of raw materials at high prices is the reason for the maintenance of high quotations on spring underwear. Prices on both spring and fall hosiery, as well as fall underwear, vary in comparsion with those of last year in degree as material or wages enter most largely into the cost. Where materials are a large factor the reductions are most pronounced and vice versa. Premier Drury, while expressing himself as thoroughly in favor of the principles of the bill, took the ground that the time had not arrived for the enactment of such legislation.

The object of the bill, said the Premier, was admirable.

"But, to my mind, complusion would be unthinkable," he proceeded. "There would be two effects; it would be a great wrong to the feelings of many an innocent persons, and it would drive those suffeting from these conditions into illicit relations. I would expect to ee, following this measure, an outbreak of illegitimacy as a direct result of it."


