ATTEMPT AT JAIL DELIVERY FAILED

Plucky Turnkey Defied Drawn Revolver and Rushed at Assailant.

Ottawa, July 22.—An alleged attempt at jail delivery was staged at the Hull County Jail the other afternoon when Murdock Munroe, a returned soldier, who was recently released from the institution, cut the telephone wires and thrust

a revolver in the face of Turnkey Reynolds, ordering him to hold up his hands. The turnkey, however, rushed at his assailant, who took to flight. After a lengthy chase Munroe was captured on Chateaugay street. This morning he was remanded till Friday on a charge of drawing a revolver with the intention of intimidating an official of the jail.
