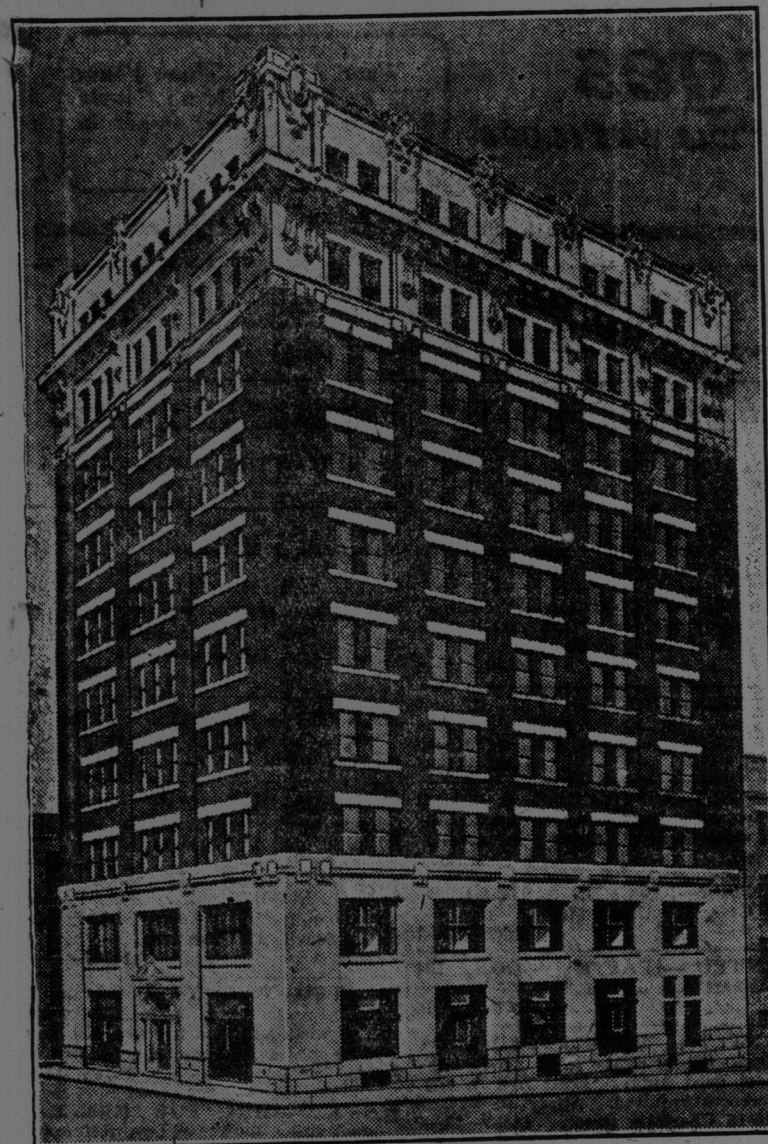

The magnificent building shown above, and situated at the corner of St. Lawrence Boulevard and La Rayer streets, Montreal, will be occupied by the SALADA TEA COMPANY about February 1st, next. The building at present occupied by SALADA, at the corner of St. Paul and St. Sulpice streets, Montreal, was erected by them eleven years ago, but for some time has proved inadequate for their business.

FURTHER REDUCE

U. S. PUBLIC DEBT.
Washington, Nov. 4.—Treasury operations for October resulted in a further reduction in the public debt of the United States, according to figures made public showing the gross debt to be \$24,022,609,672. This represents a reduction of \$25,846,425 during the month.

Ordinary expenditures of the government during the month totalled \$426,

497,372 against total ordinary receipts of \$220,034,804. The difference of \$206,462,567 was more than overcome, however, by other transactions by the department affecting the public debt.

SHOWGIRL SCALPED
AS AUTO HITS TREE

Stepson of Late Morton F. Plant and of Col. Hayward Also Severely Hurt.

Miss Helen Jesmer of the chorus of "The Greenwich Village Follies" was at the point of death last night in Fordham Hospital as the result of a motor smashup early yesterday in the New Rochelle Road, near Hunters Point Bridge in Pelham Bay Park. She was seriously hurt when an automobile driven by Philip Morgan Plant, stepson of the late Commodore Morton F. Plant, multimillionaire, and now a stepson of Colonel William Hayward, swerved from the path of another car and went head-on into a tree.

The chorus girl's skull was fractured, her jaw broken and the top of her scalp was torn off. Young Plant, who is 19 years old, suffered a fracture of the right leg and was cut deeply on the face. Norman L. Hussey, 19 years old, of Norwalk, Conn., suffered contusions, and Charles L. Morehead, 20 years old, of Chicago, received a broken nose. The two other young men in the car, David Calhoun of St. Louis and Edward Hershey of St. Paul escaped uninjured.

According to the stories told to the police, Plant and his party were en route to this city from New Haven. It was said the car was proceeding at a moderate speed when it came to the sharp turn in the New Rochelle Road, the site of many other accidents. There it met two other cars, and some difficulty with the steering gear sent the Plant machine crashing into a big "button ball" tree.

The occupants of the car were flung in all directions.

Detective Sergeant George Booth of the City Island Station and other motorists were attracted by the cries and Miss Jesmer and the others were taken to the Fordham Hospital.

Shortly after the accident, Colonel Hayward, who led the 15th New York Infantry overseas, and was decorated for bravery, came to the hospital with Mrs. Hayward. They directed that five nurses be assigned to the injured.

Miss Jesmer is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Jesmer of 1414 First Avenue, Seattle, Wash. She came to this city two years ago when she was 17 years old. Her first engagement was in a dancing act at the Hotel des Artistes, in West Sixty-eighth Street, an act in partnership with Lubovska. Then she was in the Ziegfeld "Follies" and finally went with the "Greenwich Follies."

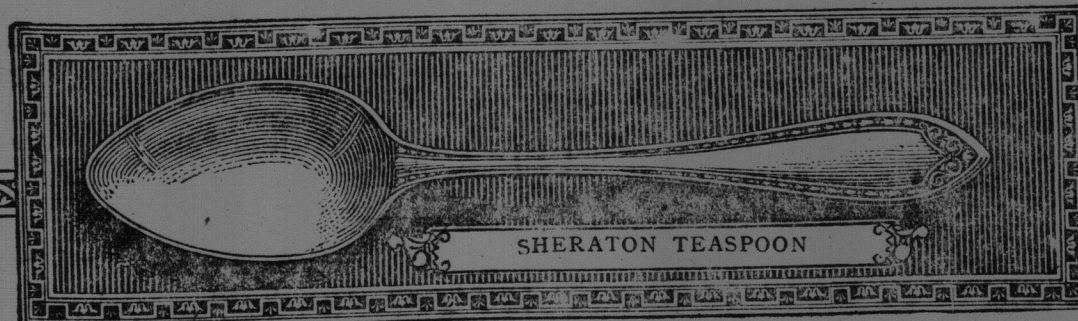
