

The Foreign Relations Committee's reservation to Article of the league of nations covenant, as adopted by the U. S. Senate reads:—

"The United States assumes no obligation to preserve the territorial integrity or political independence of any other country or to interfere in controversies between nations, whether members of the league or not, under the provisions of Article X, or to employ the military or naval forces of the United States under any article of the treaty for any purpose unless in any particular case the Congress, which under the constitution has the sole power to declare war or authorize the employment of military or naval forces of the United States, shall by act or joint resolution so provide.

Article X of the league covenant reads:—

"The members of the league undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integration of the S. S. Batsford, charged with disregarding and disobeying an order given by the harbor master, was resumed in the police court this morning. Daniel Mullin, K. 
