PASSES HUSBAND DYING IN STREET

Not Until Mrs. Graves, Wife of Broker, Reaches Home, Does She Learn He Is Dead

New York, Nov. 5.—Frank W. Graves, until four years ago a member of the New York Stock Exchange, after dinner with Mrs. Graves and Randolph Baroz, in a restaurant near Broadway and 110th street, stayed to chat with an old friend, as Mrs. Graves and Mr. Baroz walked up the street. When Mr. Graves reached the street he could not see them and boarded a surface car.

When a few doors from his home at Riverside Drive, Mr. Graves fell with a hemorrhage of the lungs. A policeman was placing him in an ambulance when Mrs. Graves and Mr. Baroz passed on their way to the Graves apartment.

IN DANGER OF DEATH IN FALLS

Log Workers Effect Rescue of Man in Disabled Motor Boat

Alone in a disabled motor boat, drifting helplessly into the reversing falls when they were tossing at their fiercest, a man who was said to be an officer on a dredge lying at Kingsville, was rescued last evening from what might have been his death. He had been on the river at Indiantown in his motor boat, but some part of the machinery had given when he was well out towards the centre of the stream. In trying to make repairs he was carried by the drift of the tide slowly but steadily towards the terrifying whirls of the falls below.

For a little time he did not realize his predicament, but immediately that he did, he began to shout for help. In the gathering darkness his boat had drifted unnoticed from the shore nearer and nearer the falls. In desperation he cried loudly and long until his shouts fell upon the ears of a crew of men in the service of James Holly & Sons, who were returning to their homes in Indiantown after work on the logs in the bay.

In the crew were Anderson, J. Dewitt Pitt and a man named Graham, and they were at once attracted by the tone of the shouts which caused them much alarm. They feared that someone was in danger at the falls and hurried to the tugboat Marvino, owned by James Holly & Sons, lying nearby. The tugboat, under Captain J. McNeill, at once steamed to the falls, where the dangerous situation of the man in the disabled launch was realized. After a few minutes the men on board the tug managed to take the launch in tow and effect a rescue, though not without considerable risk to themselves. They brought the boat and its lone occupant to shore.

It was very fortunate for him that his cries reached the ears of these men. It is said by those whose work causes them to be much about the wharves at Indiantown that some foolhardy persons apparently thinking it quite a joke, have played what they considered a hoax upon them by giving a false alarm in an effort to bring them hurrying to a rescue. A case of this kind recently occurred when some men on their way home after their day of toil upon the logs heard shouts for help coming from the vicinity of Marble Cove and immediately ran to lend an aiding hand.

When they reached the spot they saw two young men near Howard's wharf who were then quiet but who were thought to have uttered the cries as a "joke." The humor could hardly be appreciated by the tired workmen.

SEVEN HOURS IN DEATH GRIP OF STEAM SHOVEL AT HALIFAX TERMINALS

Bridgewater Man Saved by Heroic Work — Slight Move Would Have Meant Death

Halifax, Nov. 5.—Artemus Oickle, of Bridgewater, N. S., an employee of the Cook & Kane Company, while at work directing the movement of a big steam shovel at an unloading terminal, what day was caught in the adjusting wheel of the mammoth machine and held for seven hours in a death grip. His body was in such a position that if the wheel had moved six inches one way or the other it meant certain death from decapitation.

At five minutes past ten last night seven hours heroic and strenuous work on the part of his fellow employees, expert machinists, doctors and hospital attendants, the pluck supporting the big wheel was filed apart, and amid the cheers of hundreds of onlookers the man was released with no worse injuries than a fractured forearm, and a bruised and cramped back. Late last night he was resting easily.

NINE POSTAL CLERKS AMONG THOSE KILLED

Sixteen Bodies Taken From Train Wreckage in France; May Be Others

Melin, France, Nov. 5.—Sixteen bodies were taken during the night from the burned and splintered passenger coaches of the Marseilles-Paris express train, wrecked late last evening in a collision near here with a local train. It is believed several more bodies are still among the wreckage.

LONDON COMMENT ON CANADIAN GRAIN TRADE

London, Nov. 5.—The second of a series of articles on the Canadian grain trade appears in the Times financial columns this morning. The action of the provincial governments is reviewed. It is pointed out that the Manitoba government was the first to respond to the pressure of the grain growers to embark in the elevator business, and proceeds to show the development and capacity of the grain elevators throughout the dominion.
