

London, Feb. 14.—(A. P. by Mail).—
The Church of England today is faced with the necessity of deciding the long-debated question of whether its forty-seven historic edifices in the financial district of London shall be sold for 6,000,000 or 7,000,000 pounds sterling, of which the church stands in great need, or whether they shall be preserved as priceless relics of antiquity at a great financial sacrifice.

Nineteen of the edifices are in sections of the city where there is virtually no attendance on Sunday. These alone would bring nearly 2,000,000 pounds.

Thus utilitarianism and sentiment are tugging at the hearts of high church leaders, who are reluctant to see these ancient examples of church architecture razed, but who are hard put to keep them going, to say nothing of the difficulties of erecting and manning churches in thickly populated districts. There is a strong sentiment in the church in favor of disposing of these old seldom-used churches at great financial profit in order adequately to develop church needs in more fertile fields.






