RESOLUTION ON IRISH MATTERS

Text of Message by N. B.
Self-Determination Branch
Convention to Premier
Lloyd George and De Va-
lera.

The annual convention of the New
Brunswick Division of The Self Deter-
mination Branch of the Irish League of Canada
and Newfoundland, which was held at
Grand Falls, N. B., Sunday and Mon-
day, Aug. 28 and 29, was probably the
most successful convention that the
northern town has been called upon to
entertain. Delegates were present from
the majority of the provincial branches
and from all points of the province, to-
talling more than a hundred.

On Sunday afternoon a memorial ser-
vice was held in the beautiful Church of
the Assumption of the Most Blessed
Virgin Mary, an eloquent tribute to
the men and women of Ireland, and Rev.
J. Albert, P. P., Grand Falls, spoke in
French. Benediction of the Most Blessed
Sacrament was given by Rev. Eloi
Martin, St. Andre, Mad. Co., Rev. Cle-
ment, St. John, and Rev. J. J. Pickett,
St. John, who were present at the church
and at present station at Indian Point,
Tobique, was also in the sanctuary.

In the evening a public meeting was
held in McLaughlin's hall, which proved
too small to hold all who wished to at-
tend. The chair was taken by W. E.
McMongle. After an address of wel-
come to the convention had been extend-
ed by Major Collins, Messrs. M. E.
Agar, Rev. M. J. Pickett, Rev. T. Albert,
Miss Katherine Grady and M. Keegan.
The meeting was closed with the sing-
ing of the National Anthem and God
Save Ireland. The hall was prettily de-
corated in Irish and Canadian colors.

Lunch was served the delegates in
one of the most delightful out of door
spots in the province—the Wells in the
Locks, a little below the great falls,
where the St. John River narrows to a
gorge. Both luncheon and supper were
enjoyed there and proved most delig-
tious.

The business sessions of the conven-
tion were held on Monday, opening in
the forenoon at 10 o'clock. Reports
were read from the various officers and
matters of general interest taken up.
Representatives, 321 in all, were present.
Resolutions were also taken up.

Whereas, His Majesty King George V.
has again shown his generosity and his
consideration for others by signing
the Statute in Ireland; and
Whereas, the truth of God is now in
existence and negotiations are being
carried on between Premier Lloyd George
and President De Valera; and
Whereas, we, as Canadian citizens,
realize that to come to the aid of
any of its units to remain within the
empire is a negation of the principles
upon which we understand it to be
founded, viz., government only by the
consent of the governed; therefore we
Resolved that the nature of the
New Brunswick Division of The Self-
Determination Branch of the Irish League
of Canada and Newfoundland does earnest-
ly ask that the negotiations between
Premier Lloyd George and President De
Valera may terminate in a peace satis-
factory to the Irish and English nations
and a peace of justice that will end the
centuries of struggle, ruinous alike to
England and to Ireland, and a cause of
reproach to Canada as a part of the
British Empire, and a fruitful source of
danger to the peace of the world; and
further
Resolved that, as our constitution
provides, we do not wish to suggest to
the leaders of the movement in the
land what the nature of the proposals
shall consist of but we heartily endorse
any settlement that is satisfactory to
legally elected representatives of the
Irish people; and further
Resolved that a copy of these resolu-
tions be forwarded to Premier Lloyd
George and President De Valera.

A resolution of thanks for the hospi-
tality of the people of Grand Falls was
also passed.
The election of officers resulted as
follows:
President—Hugh O'Neill, Fredericton.
Vice-President—Chas. H. Hagger, St.
John.
Second Vice-President—J. P. Buckley,
Bathurst.
Third Vice-President—Rev. M. J.
Pickett, Chatham.
Secretary—Mrs. George Carvill, St.
John.
Treasurer—Miss Annie Sharkey, St.
John.

Each branch is also to have a repre-
sentative on the executive.
The business of the convention being
concluded the delegates were taken for
a lawn fête at the residence of W. E.
McMongle which was a most delig-
htful event. They were then taken for
an automobile drive along the St. John
River as far north as Van Buren, an
outing of interest to all the way. The
hospitality of the people of Grand Falls
will be long remembered by all who at-
tended.

TROUBLE IN ITALY

State of Siege at Place Where
Bomb Explosion Marked
Monument Unveiling.

London, Aug. 31.—A dispatch to the
Times from Rome dated Monday says
a state of siege is reported to have been
proclaimed near Portofino, five miles
east of Genoa, where one person was
killed and ten persons were wounded
during disorders between republicans
and royalists.

The dispatch says that about 10,000
republicans had assembled for the in-
auguration of a monument to Oberdan
(an Italian who was executed in 1882
for attempting to kill the Emperor of
Austria).

During the opening speech a bomb
was thrown by royalists and firing from
revolvers immediately followed.

AUSTRIAN TROOPS ARE POLICING THE DISPUTED AREA

Vienna, Aug. 31.—Eight thousand Aus-
trian troops moved into the Mattedoff
district of Hungary yesterday and will
police the region and guard the foreign
element there. Fear was expressed here
that this deployment was a part of the
policy that the Hungarians in the dis-
puted areas have been destroying, view-
ing the Hungarians under Lieut. Huj-
szar.

Refugees arriving here from Oberdan
say that city is quiet but wholly in
the control of the insurgents.

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CHIEF RABBI IS WELL PLEASED WITH CANADA

London, Aug. 31.—(Canadian Press)—
The Chief Rabbi of England on return-
ing last night after a tour of the
continent, was enthusiastic over the
tolerance characterizing the dominions
and the proud consciousness and pos-
sible of the Jewish people in joining
the commonwealth of nations.

PUT BAN ON SOME GERMAN PAPERS

Berlin, Aug. 31.—The minister of the
interior today prohibited the publica-
tion of certain German Nationalist organs,
including the Deutsche Zeitung, in ac-
cordance with the decree of President
Ebert. The police are also looking for
Ottow von Hirschfeld, who some time
ago tried to murder Herr Erzberger and
was sent to prison.

Hirschfeld was released recently for
reasons of health, and since then there
has been no trace of him. His parents
disclaim all knowledge of his where-
abouts. They have been brought to
Berlin for further investigation.

WIRELESS TO FORT NORMAN AND FORT SMITH

Edmonton, Aug. 31.—Edmonton and
all the outside world is soon to have
direct wireless communication with Fort
Norman and Fort Smith as well as other
northern points, according to plans of a
local firm that has just been granted a
federal license for the operation of com-
mercial wireless between these points.

Marconi equipment will be brought from
the coast. It is expected to have the
system in full operation by the early
spring.

With the installation of wireless upon
the northern steamers, a continuous sys-
tem of wireless will be available through-
out the north.
