

not closed at any time during the summer. The Infant class has 72 names on the roll, and is conducted most efficiently by Mrs. Symons. Mr. Kinloch's Bible-class for young women has 16 names on its roll; that of Mr. Evans, for young men, has 19: both are progressing most satisfactorily. In December last, one of the scholars undertook and carried out successfully arrangements for a concert, the proceeds of which were applied to painting and otherwise improving the Chapel. A proposal is now under consideration for the enlargement of the building so as to allow room for conducting the classes more advantageously.

The Missionary collections for 1879 amount to \$78.29. The school supports an orphan in India at the cost of \$20 per annum. Sabbath evening services are conducted in the Chapel under the management and at the expense of St. Matthew's congregation, Point St. Charles.
