Chicago Man, Long Missing After an Accident, Finally Found in Racine

Brought Back Home, He Seems to Recognize His Wife, But Knows No One Else.

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 27.—Frank H. Whitten, president of the Bible class of the California Avenue Congregational Church and an employer of the People's Light and Coke Company, who had been missing since September 10, returned home after a few days' absence.

Throughout the day friends called at the home of his wife, Dr. Lawrence Ryan who is attending him, and Dr. D. F. Fox, his pastor, were allowed to enter the deserted room where Whitten lay.

Mr. Whitten was brought back to Chicago from Racine by Grant Seaton, who had conducted a personal search for the missing man. Whitten had entered the quarters of the Young Men's Christian Association in Racine one evening and in a rambling and incoherent manner managed to make his identity known.

BY-ELECTION TO CHOOSE MCINTYRE'S SUCCESSOR
