SOUTH AFRICA.

Two Very Interesting Letters from Corp. Ralph Markham.

Was an Eye Witness of the Death of Lieut. Borden-Beverely Armstrong Recovering from Effects of His Wound.

NEAR REITFONTEIN, July 17.-I take this opportunity to let you know I am all right. We are waiting for crders at the foot of the kopje where poor Borden was hit. I saw the whole thing, as he was only ten feet from me. The Boers were coming up one side and we were coming up the other. We got there first. Borden got up to advance the troop a few paces and he was standing about ten seconds when he dropped, shot right through the heart, and died in about thirty seconds. Sergeant Ryan and I each show a Boer about 50 paces from us. After Lieut. Borden was shot we simply hugged the earth for half an hour The rifle fire was awful. You remember me telling you about Burch; he was shot through the lungs. I was at the Royal School of Cavalry at Toronto with him. Shea of B squadron has just shot himself accidentally in the foot. I was not in the scrap v. hen

Bev. Armstrong was hit, being at Irene after remounts. ELIPHANTS FONTEIN, July 18.-Probably long before this you will have heard of the deaths of Lieutenants Borden and Burch, which occurred in action about five miles from where we are camped. We had been waiting for orders about two hours at some distance from the kopje. When we were sent for we had to ride about a quarter of a mile to get to the kopje, and several bullets whistled around us John.

I said to Ryan, "There they are." We both fired at once, and all three dropped. We dropped, too, for the bullets were coming pretty thick. returned to camp. Mr. Borden and Burch's funeral was eld the next night at 9 o'clock and was the most impressive ceremony I ever witnessed. Mr. Borden's troop furnished the firing party, and the whole regiment was present. The brigade elergyman read the burial service. Mr. Burch was first shot in the leg and then through the lungs

A chap named Mulloy in A squadron was hit right between the eyes with an expanding bullet which tore both his eyes out. It is very doubtful if he will live.

Bev. Armstrong, who was hit in the foot with a piece of shrapnel a day or two before, has gone to Johannesburg hospital. His wound is not at all serious, and he will probably be with us again before long. The case of White. who had a piece of shrapnel through his body, is much more serious, and it is doubtful if he will pull through. They are going to use the X rays to

locate the bullet. Today we were issued with pickles, extra jam, tobacco, malted milk and tomatoes. Tomorrow we are going to shift camp, but as usual we have not the slightest idea to what place. RALPH MARKHAM.
