


ADMIRAL HOPKINS AND THE BLAKE.

The First Visit of the Finest Warship in the North Atlantic Squadron to this Port.



WHAT TO EAT IN SUMMER.

It is a Common Mistake to Reduce the Diet to a Very Low Point. One of the commonest mistakes of house-keepers is to reduce the bill of fare in summer to such moderate dimensions that it fails to fill the demand of the system for good and wholesome nourishment.

The summer diet should not be reduced in quantity, but changed in quality. Heavy dishes containing animal fat and spices, like plum puddings, rich meats like pork, or even roasts of beef or mutton, are not in keeping with sultry weather.

Another mistake is to serve cold meats and food soups on the summer dinner-table. Such dishes are much more difficult to digest than when they are well heated.
