Calumet, Mich., Aug. 30.—One of the most remarkable escapes from death in the annals of the Lake Superior copper industry occurred yesterday at the Grand Trunk.

Montreal, August 30.—Some one hundred employees of the Grand Trunk who answered the strike call nearly two months ago, are still out of positions, notwithstanding that the strike has been settled for several weeks. The majority of these are freight conductors, whose former places are still occupied by the men who took positions as strike-breakers, with a three months' engagement. The unemployed men are still receiving remuneration from the strike fund.

A number of those out of positions are passenger conductors, who in the days previous to the strike almost invariably had charge of trains carrying railway officials on inspection trips.

THE Red Jacket shaft, of the Calumet and Hecla mine, when Mike B. Sunrich, a timberman, in stepping down a repair cage to the main cage, fell into the shaft.
