The following resolution of the St. John Presbytery has been forwarded to the family of the late Rev. G. MacNeill:—"The Presbytery of St. John records with grief the death of Rev. G. MacNeill, who died at his home in Wolfville, N. S., on October 30, 1913. He was a native of Nova Scotia and was educated at Auburn Seminary, New York, taking his final year in theology in Halifax Presbytery in 1892. He held pastorates in Lochaber, N. S., Murray Harbor and Belfast congregations, P. E. I., accepting a call to his late congregation in Avonmore, Ont. in 1909. He was a man of most kindly disposition and a good preacher. He leaves a wife and family of small children.

The ordination and induction of Mr. John T. MacNeill, M. A. B. D., who accepted the call to Chipman congregation, will be held in the Presbyterian church, Chipman, on Thursday, Nov. 14th, at 7:30 p. m. At the meeting of the presbytery of St. John, called for the purpose, Dr. J. H. MacVicar will preside, ordain and induct. Rev. J. H. Anderson will address the congregation.

The trustees of the Ramapatnam Theological Seminary have taken an advance step in providing for a beginning of such a course in medical training and practical midwifery for the women students. They are the wives of those who will be pastors and workers, and so will return to the people among whom medical help is so sorely needed. The alleviation of suffering and the enlightenment which such a woman may bring to her village, or the help which she may give to her missionary will be very great. Furthermore one of the great objects of medical missionary work, that of securing access to the higher castes, will be directly affected. Women workers, whose efforts are now almost entirely confined to the Christian and low-caste communities, will find ready welcome in caste homes when they come with a ministry of healing. The financial results of such work will be a decided contribution toward the solution of the problem of self-support, as has been shown in places where such work has been done."

Churches and Men. Roxborough church, Philadelphia, Rev. J. B. Champlain pastor, which will soon celebrate its 125th anniversary, has an experience to relate in the matter of missionary giving. Two and a half years ago the duplex envelope system was adopted. Before this time the missionary offerings amounted to less than \$400 yearly. Since then they have gradually increased. At a recent business meeting the chairman of the missionary committee reported that the offerings of church and Sunday school for the past year had reached the total of \$1,700.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres per tract. One applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. In unworked territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the agent or sub-agent in person is required for the district, must in all cases be made within thirty days after the date of the sale to the agent within thirty days after filing application.

PLACED.—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery of coal in the Dominion of New Brunswick, may be granted a lease for an area of 100 acres. The lease shall be for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 25c per ton. The lease shall be granted to the discoverer or his assigns. The lease shall be subject to the provisions of the Coal Mines Act, 1912.
