PRINTERS ASKING FOR MORE MONEY

Toronto, April 6.—Employees of book and job printing offices in the city want a conference with the employers over the wage question but so far their request has been denied, as the agreement between the employees and employers does not expire until 1921. The present pay is \$2 a week or 66 cents an hour. The printers call attention to the fact that laborers are demanding from 70 cents to 85 cents an hour, and they think in view of

the increase in the cost of living since they made the agreement with the employers, that a conference would result in an advanced scale of wages. A meeting of the job printers will be held next Saturday night, when the question will be discussed. There is a possibility of a strike if their demands are ignored by the employers.
