SHAMROCK IN THE AMERICA'S CUP SERIES

Sir Thomas Lipton's Challenger Proved Yesterday That She Was Superior to the United States Defender Even in a Light Breeze—Won the Thirty Mile Triangular Course Event By Two Minutes and Twenty-Six Seconds Official Time Over Time Allowance Given—Shamrock Only Needs One More Victory to Lift the Cup That Has Been Held in United States Since 1851.

Sandy Hook, N. J., July 20.—Shamrock IV, British challenger for the America's Cup, home wing and wing to her second victory over the defender, Resolute, today, placed herself within striking distance of the coveted trophy. Tomorrow's race, if she wins it, will clinch the series for Shamrock IV, while Resolute must take three straight to keep the famous cup on this side of the Atlantic.

Today's race, the first of three starts in which both yachts crossed the finish line, saw the trim hull of Sir Thomas Lipton's emerald challenger and her vast spread of white canvas always in the lead, save for a brief period at the start when her balloon jib toppled and fouled as it was broken out, and Resolute forged temporarily into first place.

The thrills were all saved for the last twelve miles of the thirty-mile triangular sail. Both yachts had hauled along in a vagrant breeze, Shamrock steadily drawing away from her glistering white pursuer, until the challenger came within about two miles of the second mark. There she caught a freshening north-wester and started up, breaking out her balloon jib top and spinnaker as she rounded the stake for a wing and wing run home before the breeze.

Resolute was still floundering along in a near calm, more than a mile from the stake. Suddenly the breeze struck her, and the trim craft, heeling over, until her decks were awash, darted forward in pursuit. She seemed fairly to leap through the sea, flinging the white spray high as she tore along. She gained the mark in an incredibly short time and swinging close to the buoy, broke out her balloon and strained forward like a thoroughbred on the homestretch, but a tricky breeze, which had appeared to favor Shamrock from the start, had given the challenger too great a lead to be overcome and she swept across the finish line at Ambrose Channel Lightship nine minutes and 27 seconds ahead of Resolute—a victory by two minutes and 26 seconds after the handicap, imposed because of her greater sail area, had been deducted.

When she had crossed the finish line through the screeching feet of spectator craft, Shamrock swung about and cruised leisurely back to place.

Fisherman's main topmast set on a stay from the end of the bowsprit to 10 feet below the cross trees. There was a big space between the two sails and as Resolute was striking it along under balloon only, the defender drew out until she was more than half mile ahead.

Then the wind became tickle. Shamrock, which had worked out to windward, found the edge of the breeze just as Resolute did when she gained such a lead last Saturday. Nursing the draft of air carefully, Burton ran by Resolute so fast that it looked as if the defender had dropped her anchor. In fifteen minutes, the challenger was half a mile to the good, due apparently to the noble work of the fisherman's topmast, just above the forelock.

This practically settled the race. Resolute could not find the breeze, and although Captain Adams handled her wonderfully well the draft of air shunned her almost completely. Shamrock turned the first mark three minutes and a half in the lead and at once picked up a nice breeze which gave her more margin over the defender, in fact half way on the second leg, which through a cutting of the wind proved a fetch for more than half the way, Shamrock at one time had a lead of a mile and a half.

Four miles from the second mark, fortune again favored the Ulster boat. The wind dropped and then came from the South West. This gave both boats a close fetch on the port tack, for the mark. Shamrock naturally picked it up first and pulled still further ahead, her boat at the turn being over nine minutes.

Although it looked like Shamrock's race with only ten miles to slide down to the finish, Resolute had a seeming advantage of bringing up a better breeze. However, the breeze softened astern instead of freshening, and although Resolute tacked to leeward under balloon, Shamrock, under spinnaker and balloon jib, sailing straight course, gained nearly a minute in the run.
