AROUND THE CITY

ST. ANDREWS BOOMING. Frank Kennedy, Mayor of St. Andrews, was in the city yesterday and reported conditions in that town as the best. There is no unemployment and a lot of building is being done.

ST. DAVID'S WOMEN'S LEAGUE. The Women's League of St. David's church held their regular monthly meeting yesterday afternoon in the church Sunday school rooms, with the president, Mrs. M. H. Dunlop, in the chair. Only routine business was transacted.

EMPEROR OF BRITAIN. A radio from the Empress of Britain received yesterday indicated the big liner would arrive here late Friday evening, the passengers disembarking Saturday morning. Among the prominent personages aboard are General MacNaughton, T. M. Merton, Captain of Engineers and Rev. W. Clayton, Captain of Engineers, and Mr. G. E. S. F. E. Clayton, M. C. of Ottawa.

The number of passengers sailing on the Metagama next Friday night will be 569 cabin and 481 third class. The original figures published have been augmented by two ship's crews, who will embark at Halifax, where the liner is going to load 10,000 barrels of apples.

It was said that the people have responded to the call for boots and clothing, but the committee tried to emphasize the need for children's goods, clothing, and they also wish to announce that yarn can be procured at the depot for the purpose of knitting mittens and stockings for the children, a large number of which articles are needed in connection with the families of returning soldiers, in providing them with clothing and food.

Addition To The Public Library

Anson McKim Memorial Section on Advertising Topics' Fourteen Books Will be Added to.

A collection of books, dealing with advertising, has been established in the public library of this city by the Canadian Advertising Association. The section is known as the "Anson McKim Memorial Section on Advertising Topics," and will perpetuate the memory of the late Anson McKim, who was the founder of the business of specialized service to advertisers, and who, during his life time, did a great deal to promote public and private interests through advertising.

This section will be helpful to young men desirous of improving their knowledge of advertising methods and practices. Fourteen books form the nucleus of the section, which will be added to from time to time by the interest on the invested fund. Several other cities in Canada have had similar sections established in their libraries. The fund for the purpose was raised by voluntary subscription from Canadian publishers.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL FINANCE COMMITTEE HOLD THREE SESSIONS

Considered Estimates for Year 1922 and Failed to Pass Single Item—Board of Health Assessment Turned Down—County Secretary Pointed Out That Those Who Voted Against Are Liable to Imprisonment.

The finance committee of the municipal council spent the entire day yesterday in the consideration of estimates for the year 1922 and failed to pass a single item. The request from the Board of Health for an assessment of \$1,000 was voted down by a vote of four to five in this committee, but the county secretary pointed out that the law called for the passing of this item and those who voted against it were guilty of a criminal offense and liable to imprisonment for one year or a fine of \$1,000 and the county secretary refused to obey the orders of the committee and voted it through. Criticism

The committees made reference to the large number of nurses and student nurses on the staff and criticized an amount of \$6,000 for an expert radiographer to be secured. The wages agreed for nurses put down at \$54,572 and this salary list was sent back with a request that further reductions be made. It was suggested by one councillor that a cut of 6 per cent be made all round but this was not recommended to the commissioners.

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
