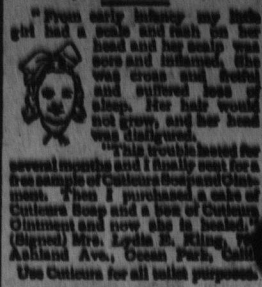

GRAVELY WARNS AMERICA THAT TROUBLE BREWS

Propagandists Vexed by Alien Restriction Laws—Steamship Lines Busy.

London, Feb. 22.—The propaganda of British steamship interests against the American immigration restrictions is mentioned in the foreign press. The propaganda is being carried on by the publication in a shipping paper of a grave warning to the United States that the immigration restrictions are a serious menace to the shipping industry.

What is evidently causing much anxiety is the suggestion that 60 per cent of the immigrants must travel in American ships.
