

Bear Island, Queensbury, Prince William and Dumfries churches. He has preached seventy times, made one hundred and eighty-two calls, attended thirty-six prayer meetings and twelve conferences; he has baptized three at Bear Island and three at Canterbury. For some weeks he was laid up. It has been, all things considered, a busy and quite trying year, but God's blessing has not failed.

Rev. C. T. Phillips is closing his fifteenth year as pastor of the Woodstock church, during which time he has done excellent work—in the earlier years of his pastorate heroic work, which held a church threatened with destruction, and made denominational history. Of the year now closing, he says, "The church had revival; nine were baptized. We have good congregations; a large number of young people attend. Good prayer meetings. Held fortnightly Sunday afternoon meetings at South Wakefield, a young and small church. It ought to have more care; it will pay to give it care."

Rev. J. W. Clarke is about closing eight useful years as pastor of the Waterloo street church, St. John. He says, "During these years there have come to us many evidences of progress, the year now closing being one of the best. As a result of special services last spring twenty-two were received into the church, fifteen by baptism and seven by letter. The first two weeks the Rev. B. H. Nobles and singing evangelist Britton led the services, after which the pastor continued them, with the above results. One of those converted, whom we all feel God is calling into public service, has on several occasions preached to interested congregations. The Sunday School and C. E. Society are doing good work; the Sunday services and the prayer meetings have been well attended, and most encouraging."

Rev. J. J. Barnes, pastor of the Waterville pastorate, reports the spiritual life in all the churches (Waterville, Third Tier, Seventh Tier, Lakeville and Brookville) "good and growing." He is to continue pastor another year.

Rev. O. N. Mott's pastorate consists of Blissville, Mill Settlement and Patterson churches, and Clarendon, which is a branch of Patterson church. He "held special meetings at Patterson which strengthened the church." Two were baptized. He will remain another year—the third.

Rev. G. W. Foster's pastorate consists of Keswick and Kingsley churches, the first named having two preaching places—Mouth Keswick and Douglas. He reports that "in the early part of the year he held special meetings at Mouth Keswick; four were baptized, and the spiritual life of the church was
