Rules Made Clearer.

The annual meeting of the O.R. F.U. will in future be held in the early part of September. At the annual meeting in Toronto, on Saturday the proposal to change the date was thoroughly discussed, and although there was some opposition, it was decided that to do so would be in the best interests of the union. Secretary Hewitson refused to again hold office, and as a result President DeGruchy was given the right to select his successor. The Secretarys report showed that during the season just closed nearly one thousand players competed under O.R.F.U. rules. These figures show that the older organization is far in advance of other Canadian unions in developing material.

Despite the fact that MeGill University and M.A.A.A. declined to compete in the Dominion final thereby entailing considerable loss to the O.R.F.U. the Treasurer's report showed a good balance on hand to start next season. The proposed amendments to the rules caused some discussion. That relative to making it clearer that a team could either serimmage or kiek the ball at the quarter way after a rouge, deadline or safety touch was passed, as was that clearing up the question of whether the ball should be taken to halfway or forty yards out after a field goal. It shall be kicked from the forty-yard lime.
