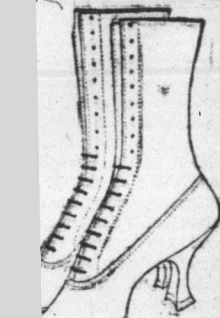

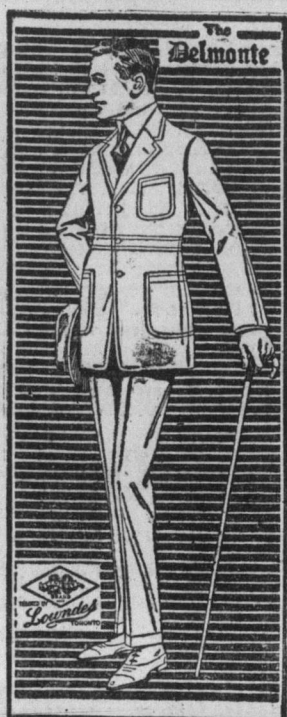

HOUSING SCHEMES MANY IN ENGLAND.

Practically All Municipalities
Have Initiated Large Pro-
jects.

The urgency of the housing ques-
tion has attracted attention in all
parts of England, and local authori-
ties generally are pressing forward
schemes for supplying the lack of
accommodation. In few areas is the
position more serious than it is in
Yorkshire, where every town and
even a great number of villages,
have adopted various schemes. Most
landlords have a waiting list of
hundreds of names on their books.
Good progress has been made in
the provision of houses at Leeds
and it is estimated that within the
year 4,000 modern dwellings will
be erected for workpeople at quite
modest rentals.

In order to popularize the scheme
and to meet the needs of prospec-
tive householders, the committee
has decided to display the plans
with explanations, to a number of
representative women from that
class likely to provide the tenants,
in order that criticisms and sugges-
tions may be made.

In Every District.
The housing problem is serious
throughout the West Riding, and
particularly in the large industrial
centres of Bradford, Tuddersfield,
Halifax and the heavy woolen dis-
trict, but every authority has hous-
ing in hand. In the South Staffs
industrial area housing schemes are
being organized in every district.
The need of houses is very acute,
and the proposals project several
thousand dwellings.

The first 500 houses under the
Crolyon scheme are to be let at
9s. to 12s. 6d weekly, exclusive of
rates, which will be collected with
the rents in equal weekly instal-
ments.
