## MANUFACTURERS TO FORCE TARIFF REDUCTION

Captain Blenkhorn, representing H. E. Miles, President of American Association, makes Significant Reference to Mr. Miles' Interview with New York Herald.

That the implement and vehicle manufacturers of the United States will force congress at its next sitting to make rigid inquiry into tariff conditions with a view to revoking the Dingley schedule, can be read between the lines of an interview recently given the New York Herald by H. E. Miles, chairman of the National Reciprocity and Tariff Committee and president of the Association of American Implement and Vehicle Manufacturers, whose confidential representative, Capt. Blenkhorn is now in Regina establishing a Canadian headquarters for the Racine Sattley Co., of which Mr. Miles is the head, and who, no doubt, is playing a diplomatic game in reaching out for business in western Canada at the present time.

In conversation with Capt. Blenkhorn The West learned that there is a reciprocity motive behind the action of the American Manufacturers who will force the hands of congress on the tariff question, and instead of Canada going to the United States, the Americans will continue to us. Should this political move be successful Canadians will have access to the American markets and while reciprocal arrangements between the two countries might not formally follow, the great barrier will be broken down, and the tendency is bound to be towards closer commercial unity.

The situation is full of interest for western Canada and Regina in particular where the large American manufacturers are making their Canadian headquarters.

Capt. Blenkhorn is not a faddist, but a sound practical business man who has the reputation of making good, and as the representative of Mr. Miles he, no doubt, knows more than he cares to divulge in a newspaper interview. He is now negotiating with Aid. Thos. Wilkinson for a large new warehouse and office building and when his arrangements are complete he will take up his residence here and with his business ability and vigor will become a prominent and leading citizen.

## DISTRIBUTING HOUSES MAKE PREMIER DISPLAY

Regina Will Control the Threshing Machinery and Implement Business of Western Canada—The Exhibits

That Regina stands first in the western provinces as a distributing centre for threshing machinery and farm implements, was demonstrated last week at the exhibition when the various big companies, who have their headquarters here, lined both sides of the main entrance with the largest exhibit of the kind that has been seen this year in the three provinces. Owing partly to the unique position we occupy in being able to accommodate these companies in the location of business sites, but largely to the geographical position of the city, we are away ahead in the race as a wholesale and distributing centre for this class of goods. Inter-views given by the managers of some of these large concerns leave no doubt that this city will shortly control the distributing of threshing machines and implement business of western Canada.

Nichols & Shepard  
E. S. Tecktonis, the western manager of the Nichols & Shepard Company, who will soon take up his residence in Regina, is a live one. He attended the fair and got in touch with a large section of the farming fraternity especially the visitors from country points. It will be remembered that some time ago this company arranged to make their Canadian headquarters in Regina, operating branch houses in both Calgary and Winnipeg. They are investing \$30,000 here in buildings, offices and a bonded warehouse and repair shops. Mr. Tecktonis estimates that they will pay in the customs here next year between thirty and forty thousand dollars. They will have between twelve and fifteen travellers working out of Regina, and will maintain a large office staff which he will bring here from Winnipeg where they are at present employed.

The Nichols & Shepard exhibit at the fair consisted of a thirty-horse power engine (fanop) top with thirty-two inch drive wheel, and large fanning steel coal bunkers and tanks. The separator was a 40-60 "Red River Special" with N. & S. self feeder and N. & S. gearless wind stacker and a "Perfection" weigher, Dakota style.

THE J. I. CASE.  
The Case people are well known in western Canada and although their agency here is only the provincial headquarters at present, they will increase their house to accommodate a larger stock. They will manufacture at Fort William and supply their western distributing houses from the head of the lakes. S. S. Mead, from the American headquarters of the firm, assisted Manager Rutledge during fair week and when seen at the exhibition gave The West his optimistic views with regard to this country. Mr. Mead was in Regina six years ago and on returning to the States expressed the opinion to the head office that this would yet be the headquarters for the distributing business for what was then the North-West Territories. Returning to the city last week he could locate himself by the old land marks, but modern Regina was quite beyond his most hopeful anticipation. Discussing the crop prospects of the Canadian west, and particularly Saskatchewan, Mr. Mead said that at present Sumner County, Kansas holds the world's record for producing the largest amount of wheat for a given area, producing eight million bushels but he believes that at no distant date that state will be displaced from that proud position by districts in Saskatchewan, and when that date arrives Regina will control western Canada's threshing machine and implement business.

The Case exhibit consisted of a 32 h.p. engine (road locomotive) for hauling heavy loads and plowing. This engine was equipped with a steam starting gear, the only one on the grounds.

Another engine was a 25 h.p. simple, for threshing and plowing. She has coal bunkers and water tank. The separator is steel the only one of that kind on exhibition. This cleaner was a 38-58, self feeder with a Dakota weigher and stacker. This is the class and make of engine used by the United States government on the Panama canal where thirty-seven are in operation.

SAWYER-MASSEY.  
The Massey-Harris Co. had a magnificent and powerful exhibit consisting of 26 h.p. compound engine, extension wheels for plowing purposes, with "Ham" headlight. The separator is a 36-60, the "Great West." It was equipped with a Woods all steel feeder. Perfection elevator with Sawyer-Massey stacker, known as the I. X. L. separating device. The manager of this company is Geo. Forsyth, NORTH-WEST THRESHER CO.

The 34 cross compound engine on exhibition by this company was a formidable looking machine carrying a 38 inch wheel, six feet six inches high. This engine is for plowing purposes. The company has sold 22 out of Regina this season. The Separator is the "North-West" 40-60 known for its straight shafting. It is completely equipped in every detail. The provincial manager of the company is John Britton.

REEVES & CO.  
The factory and home office of this big concern is in Columbus, Indiana, and their Canadian headquarters is in Regina. They moved their Canadian head-offices here in April last but owing to the delay over trackage facilities, they have not got in the position which they expected to find themselves at this date. However, they expect to commence building before September first. The manager G. S. Lowell, explained to The West that the big breaking outfit on the exhibition grounds is one of the most advantageous outfits on the market. One of their engines was a 25 simple and the other a 32 cross compound. The separator was a 40-60 with complete attachments. The rig was sold on Thursday to a Strassburg farmer and owing to this not being at present a convenient railway point from here, the outfit will go under her own steam across country.

The breaking attachment was a 12 plow gang; hitched to the engine with a big bolt which enabled the driver to back up and turn easily. The plow is steam lift.
