## WHAT IS AIDS?

AIDS is caused by a virus called HIV which attacks the body's immune system, reducing its ability to fight disease. Over time, victims of AIDS become extremely vulnerable to diseases and infections tha usually do not pose a threat to someone whose immune system is working normally; as a result, people with AIDS may die of illnesses to which non-infected people are immune.

## HOW IS THE AIDS VIRUS SPREAD?

AIDS can only start to develop after the virus reaches the bloodstream. Even though the virus may be present in one person's body fluids (such as blood or semen), it has to get into another person's bloodstream in order to cause infection.

Infected individuals, even those without symptoms may be able to pass on the virus to others and should take necessary precautions.

The AIDS virus is transmitted in four known ways:

through sexual contact with an infected person
through sharing contaminated needles or

- syringes

  through transfusion of infected blood or blood
- products
   from an infected mother to an infant in the womb
