THE PRIME MINISTER: Mr. Oliver, I understand the purpose of this meeting is to give you an opportunity to present the constitutional aspects of this question.

HON. MR. OLIVER: Well, Mr. Premier, I think Mr. McGeer would like to say a few words by way of opening, if that is agreeable to you.

THE PRIME MINISTER: Certainly.

MR.McGEER: Mr. Premier, since filing the appeal with the Privy Council. Alberta has instructed me that they wish to join in the general appeal with British Columbia, and I would like to make application now to add the Province of Alberta as party to the general appeal. I presume that would be granted.

Now, I understand the hearing to-day is for the purpose of permitting Premier Oliver to present certain features only of the appeal, namely, those that are based upon constitutional grounds generally and which establish, if the submissions are accepted, the right of the Province of British Columbia to equal treatment in the matter of transportation costs with all other parts of the Dominion of Canada under the terms of union. The submission, shortly, in connection with that is that the Province of British Columbia entered Confederation under the terms of an agreement which involved the construction of a railway that would connect the seaboard of British Columbia on the Pacific with the railway systems of Canada.
