its keeping, and in its site. Not far off we notice the Montreal College and the Grand Seminary, also constructed at the foot of the mountain; it and the Jesuits College are the most celebrated in America. The reputation of those two colleges has reached the farthest points in Canada and the United States, and from those points come many young men eager to avail themselves of a solid instruction. The Grand Seminary can contain over 300 students and supply each with a separate apartment.

Montreal has many assylums for young and old, orphans, for the blind and for deaf-mutes; also kindergartens, homes and hospitals. Amongst the most important may be mentioned. The Hotel Dieu, the Notre Dame, the General, and the Victoria (contructed on the occasion of the Queens Jubilee). The Victoria was built by gifts of \$500,000 each, donated respectively by Sir Geo. Stephens and Sir Donald Smith.

There are 200 schools (including all nationalities and both sexes); Elementary, Academic, Commercial, etc. Amongst the principal ones are: The Protestant English High School, the Catholic English High School, the Catholic Commercial Academy which amongst others has sent out so many young men who have distinguished themselves in the different branches of commerce both home and abroad and have filled most important positions of trust in our banks. This academy is a model in construction. built on an eminence, and constitutes the pride of the city. It is entered from St. Catherine street after traversing one of the most beautiful parterres in Mon-
