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KENT REAL ESTATE.

The value of real estate in this country is steadily advancing. Tilbury East seems to be taking the lead on sales transactions and the reclaimed lands in the front of the Township are eagerly sought after on account of their productive qualities and \$40 per acre is now the ruling figure with the fair prospect of an advance. The introduction of the best sugar industry into this county is having an appreciable effect on the reclaimed lands, as they are peculiarly well adapted to the growing of sugar beets, one farmer having grown the enormous crop of 30 tons per acre. The following from the Tilbury Times will give our readers an idea of the activity of real estate in that Township:

"Kippen & Scarff have sold their 50 acre farm on the 3rd Con. of Tilbury East plains to Mr. McDonald, of Hagersville, for \$40 per acre and the latter is expected here in the spring to occupy it. Jos. Gibson, the tenant, has leased a 100 acre farm on the 2nd Con. from Mrs. Jarvis, of Toronto, for \$40, who is erecting a house and barn on same. The dwelling will be ready about Christmas and will cost about \$300. The barn will be ready in the spring."—Tilbury Times.

"The recording of half a dozen farm sales in last week's Times as the output of a single real estate office here is a very good record for one week and would go to show that the times prognosticated of a few weeks ago that land would reach \$80 or \$100 per acre and would be fulfilled sooner than expected."—Tilbury Times.

## Theatrical

"THE PENITENT."  
Grand Opera House, Wednesday, December 3.

A company that includes the names of many favorite players, a scenic environment that is marvellously beautiful, and effects that add much in portraying the locale of the story, are among the promises held forth by Manager W. E. Nankerville, when he presents his powerful drama "The Penitent," at the Opera House for the consideration of playgoers Tuesday night. This play was dramatized from Hall Quine's most thrilling story, and like "The Christian," is both original in its theme and brilliant in its conception. The story is laid in the Cumberland Mountains region of England, and deals with the fortunes of two brothers and their illegitimate half brother. The young-

er son plots with his half brother to rob the rightful heir of his patrimony and wife, and aided by a wonderful resemblance between them, has his purpose practically accomplished, when his better nature reasserts itself and he makes restitution, only to fall by the bullet of his fellow conspirator. The two half brothers of mystifying resemblance, but totally different natures, are played by Louis Leon Hall. His clear cut separation of these two characters have never been excelled by any impersonation in his career. The one is a polished gentleman, and the other a graceless ruffian and braggart, but both were played with ease and finish. "The Penitent" is enacted by Albert Peters, in a "perfect and earnest manner." Myles McCarthy essays the cynical lawyer who directs the conspiracy with infinite finish. Mr. Caine, deeming him most competent for this portrayal. The comedy roles are those of a kindly, grateful Jew and gentle and lovable old person. Will Thompson Davis and David Hanchett will give to those parts just the coloring. Miss Maud Claire Shaw heads the leading female character as Greta Lowther with exquisite taste, and Miss Edith Dombly pathetically appealing as an abandoned plaything of the younger brother, while Bessie Maylow will make the most winsome Irish maid possible. The five scenes which are necessary for the development of this plot all have strong climaxes, and each received full share of approbation. On the whole, the actors are swift, the comedy and dramatic incidents scintillating with flashes of wit and most thrilling and intense. An evening of real enjoyment may be anticipated.
