LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO

The heavy offerings at the Western Cattle Morket to-day met with a very slow demand, there being but little inquiry for cattle. The supply was large. Prices remained unchanged from Friday, with the exception of butchers' grades, which were a little easier on account of the big supply. The offerings included a number of some exceptionally fine Easter beef, which found ready sales at the best price of the day. Very few common grades were offered, At noon trade livened up a little, but was not brisk enough to clear up the heavy supply. a number of head being left over at the close. The receipts were 73 carloads, including about 400 sheep and lambs, 2,000 hogs, 40 calves and the usual number of milch cows The total receipts during the week ending March 18th were :- Cattle, 3,012; sheep and lambs, 900; and hogs, 4,939 The weigh scale receipts amounted

to \$143 89.

Export cattle—The offerings were very heavy, but the demand was not active and the prices remained firm, cables from Great Britain remained steady. Choice selections of heavy exporters fetched \$4 50 to \$5 and \$5 13 for extra choice. Light exporters were

in heavy supply, but were not wanted. Butchers' Cattle—The movement in this line was not active for the early market, the offering being much heavier than expected by local dealers. Prices were a little easier, choice being quoted at \$3.75 to \$4 per cwt. A few bunches of fine Faster cattle brought \$4.50 per cwt, but there were not very many going above that figure. Common grades were in small supply at prices rauging from \$3.15, \$3.25 and \$3.75 per cwt.

Bulls—Trade in this branch was fairly active at times, heavy exporters being about the only grade in any demand. Prices remained unchanged at \$3 50 to \$4 25 per cwt. Light were in ample supply at \$3 to \$3 25 per cwt.

Stockers and feeders—The offerings were much heavier than expected, but the demand was not good and prices remained steady, choice heavy stockers for Buffalo being quoted at \$3 50 to \$3 75 per cwt. Feeders were a little farmer at \$4 to \$4 40 per cwt.

"Cows - The usual run of desirable grades of milehers were in fairly good demand at steady prices or \$35 to \$45

Calves—There was an active demand for choice yeals, which were in ample supply at steady prices or \$3 to \$10 per

Sheep and lambs—The market is steady. The offerings were about equal to the demand, everything being cleared out of the pens in good time at firm prices. Sheep for export and butchers' use sold readily at \$3.50 per cwt. Lambs were in moderate supply at \$4.50 to \$4.90 per cwt. Bucks were quiet at \$2.50 to \$2.75 per cwt.

Hogs—The run in the annex was exceptionally heavy, but the demand was active and prices remained unchanged from Friday. Choice selections fetched \$4.50 per cwt, light were steady at \$4.12½ per cwt. Thick fat were in ample supply at \$3.75 per cwt. Sows were slow at \$3.
