

RABBIT'S LEG

Is Used by Surgeons to Piece Out a Boy's Arm.

Those whose faith in the efficacy of the 'Life-Long Sufferer Tells of Quick Releft hind foot of a rabbit killed in the dark of the moon" is wavering may have their weakened belief strengthened by learning that three inches of the left hind leg which supports the lucky foot has been used with apparent success in an operation to save a boy's arm.

The operation was performed by Dr. Ralph L. MacFarland, of No. 53 Clinton avenue, Jamaica, L. I., chief of the sur-gical staff of the Jamaica hospital, upon Ralph Tomlinson, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs, James Tomlinson, of Oxford, Conn., near Ansonia. The boy is a rela

tive of the surgeon.

On Nov. 23 the boy, dragging his father's double-barrelled shot-gun across the yard, fell. Both barrels were discharged. One scharge grazed the boy's left forearm, the other entered the upper part of the arm, tearing away more than half the flesh and muscles with an inch and a half of the bone.

The bone was wired temporarily by a surgeon to hold it in place, and Dr. Mac-Farland was summoned. He said that the only way to save the arm was to graft a piece of bone into the shattered part. The lad was taken to the Griffin To preserve eggs, fill a wooden box with olive oil, and place it in the sait with the pointed end downwards. Eggs ereated in this manner will keep fresh for some time.

Holes were bored in the ends of the humerus and through the rabbit's bone, and all was made fast with silver wire

Tr. MacFarland said:

"I can see no reason why the operation should not be entirely successful. Of course, it is too soon to tell whether the rabbit and human bones will knit as we hope, but I feel confident that will be the result. I do not think that the insertion of the rabbit bone will prevent the arm from growing as the boy grows. I believe the arm will grow just as its mate, for the growth cames from the end of the arm.

UTILIZING WASTE.

(Philadelphia Record.)

It is perhaps a mistake to say there is any such thing as waste matter. In a paper recently read before the London Royal Society of Arts it was shown that sawdust when subjected in closed retorts to digestion with a weak subphurous acid solution under pressure of 160 pounds to the square inch undergoes a very effective and remarkable trans-mutation. Of the resulting product sugar is an important constituent, the mgar is an important constituent, the mount being about 25 per cent. A jumber of velatile products are also formed in the process, among them acctic acid, furfural and formaldehyde. It has not been possible to prepare from the sawdust a crystaline sugar, but the converted fibrous, product known as "sacchulose" has proved of great untriduce value as a cattle food when mixed with a small quantity of molasses or of some fatty substance.
