CORPORAL BURRELL

Writes to His Father That He is Starting for Home.

On August 23rd, Corp. Henry Burrell wrote to his father from South Africa. By mistake the letter was sent to J. Burrell, of Chatham, Kent, England. Mr. Burrell, of England, proved to be a grand uncle of the Corporal, and he forwarded the letter to Chatham, Ont., its proper destination. In forwarding it he says: The enclosed was delivered at my residence through an error of the postal authorities. I trust your dear son will arrive home safely. I can assure you there will be such a reception in London to your Canadian boys as has never been seen before. All honor to the brave sons of Canada. Your faithful father, J. BURRELL.

In his letter Corporal Burrell says: I am well. We marched into Krugersdorp yesterday and we were nearly all wiped out. We have marched over 250 miles in 20 days and now we are going to have a rest for two or three days and then march to Pretoria. There Lord Roberts will address us and then we will leave for home. We should reach Canada about October 15th by order of the Canadian Government. You will see me home about the 15th of October if we do not stop in England too long. We have not had fighting like I thought we would have. De Wet has eluded us again, but we are not going to chase him any more. I will write again when we leave Cape Town.

BY ACCLAMATION.

London, Sept. 29.—One hundred and sixty-seven constituencies, returning one-fourth of the membership of the house of commons, made their nominations to-day. Up to 1 o'clock this afternoon 58 members had been elected, unopposed, comprising 43 Conservatives, 8 Unionists, 5 Liberals and 2 Nationalists.
