THE MARKETS

There was a very good Saturday market this morning. Prices, however, have increased considerably, owing to the recent frosts. Dealers are now asking from \$1.25 to \$1.50 a bag for potatoes, and the other prices have also increased. Lettuce sells at 20 cents a pound; spinach 15 cents a peck; radishes, 3 bunches for 5 cents; rhubarb, 2 bunches for 5 cents, and plants at from 10 to 25 cents a box.

In the dairy produce department chickens brought from 20 to 40 cents each; eggs from 12 to 13 cents a dozen, and butter from 16 to 18 cents per pound.
