WHACK AT IT

Characteristic Comment of Member for East Kent on His New Legislation Bill.

The Toronto Star, in speaking of John Lee's bill in regard to the votes of mariners and railway men, says:—"John Lee, in a week's experience as a Parliamentarian, is showing great mobility in adapting himself to the ways of the Legislature, and has got to the stage already of giving notice of a bill which he proposes to introduce."

His bill aims at amending the Election Law. Employees of railroads ought, he thinks, be given a good show to mark their ballots, and he proposes to give them the privilege of going to a returning officer or justice of the peace any time within forty-eight hours before election day and making a declaration as to which candidate they wish to vote for, such declaration to count as a vote.

"It isn't right, you know," said the stalwart Mr. Lee this morning, between puffs of a cigar in the Parliament corridor. "I don't know whether I can stop it or not, but I am going to try a whack at it anyway."

There was a poor Saturday market in vegetables this morning. There were few offered and what was there was of a very poor quality and brought very high prices. Dairy produce, however, was better. The shades were filled to overflowing and although the prices were high, stuff sold very rapidly. Eggs have come down a little, the price now being 20 cents per dozen. Fowl of all kinds were very plentiful but sold at unchanged prices. Good dairy butter brought 20 cents per pound.
