A CANADIAN LLOYDS.

The statement that Mr. Clergue and other capitalists have approached the Dominion Government, for the purpose of establishing a "Canadian Lloyds," will no doubt raise the query in many minds as to what such a scheme involves.

In the Old Land 'Lloyds" consists and rheumatism. of a set of rooms on the first floor of the Royal Exchange, London, frequented by merchants, shipowners, underwriters, etc., for the purpose of obtaining shipping intelligence and transacting marine insurance. One large room, with small rooms attached to it, is set apart for the use of underwriters, and there two enormous ledgers, lie constantly open. the one containing the list of vessels arriving at the various ports, the other recording disasters at sea. There is a most complete system for securing marine information from all quanters of the globe and a statement by "Lloyds" is regarded as final with regard to shipping matters. Fees are of course charged.

#### VICTORY FOR MUNICIPAL OWN-ERSHIP.

The county council elections last week in London, England, resulted in an overwhelming majority for the Progressive party, which is pledged to municipal cwnership. The water, gas, electric light and transportation of the World's metropolis are under the control of a wast number of companies who have monopolies in their districts, and who in the past have blacked every. effort at reform. The M derate party which has been backing these corporations has been swept out of sight by the householders. The Progressives are pledged to acquirement of the water works plants or the establishment of new municipal plants. The council already owns a number of the street car lines, and will proceed to the construction of numerous new, ones in an endeavor to give London adequate transportation. The council has always undertaken the construction of model tenements for housing the poor, which will greatly increase building operations. After years of municipal lethargy, London has suddenly awakened to the inauguration of a sweeping advance.

# JEALOUS GIRE BETRAYED HIM

Kneisel, the Noted Bavarian Bandit and Robber, in the Fands of the Authorities.

Byrlin, March 9.-Kneisel, the notor ious robber, upon whom an Anglophobia newspaper lately suggested the emperor should confer the decoration of the Black Eagle because his majesty had bestowed that decoration upon Earl Roberts, has been the victim of a Dekilah's treachery, and has been captured. He is a Bavarian bandit, who is charged with several murders. He cluded the gendarmes and troops for six months, and shot two of them. All the peasants resisted the buit of 1,000 marks offered for his capture and they aided him with food and shifter even after several of them who were discovered helping the outlaw were severely punished. Kneisel discovered helping the outlaw were severely punished. appeared a few weeks ago, and it was thought that he had crossed the fron-tier, but last Sunday he suddenly appeared at a lonely farmhouse near Geisenhofen. He was heartily received and feted. The villagers arranged an evening dance and drinking bout in his honor. During the evening, how ever, he managed to arouse the jeal-ousy or anger of a young village girl, who, for revenge, went to the nearest police station and betrayed him. Poice from Munich and Augsburg were summoned and surrounded the farm.
In the morning the farmer and his wife were arrested for assisting Kneisel, who remained alone inside the house and refused to surrender. The police then fusilladed the house for an hour, after which they stormed it. The bandit was found in a small room. He immediately fired a re volver at the policemen, but failed to ht any of them. The police returned the fire, wounding Kneisel in the sto-mach and arm, and smashing one of his wrists. H; was bound and taken to Munich, where he was placed unr guard in a hospital.

He told of lakes and rivers of unquenchable flame, of horrid torments whose dreadfulness was past the power of human understanding, of devils fighting one another, and of the awful despair of the damned souls who were doomed to suffer for all

To illustrate his sermon, Mr. Ferguson gave personal experiences of fleath-bed scenes of godless men to which he had been a witness, and then he invited his hearers to come forward and be saved.
