## RAILWAY GRIEVANCES.

It is announced that the Board of Railway Commissioners will sit in this city on the 29th of this month. This announcement is what the people of Chatham have been looking for with a great deal of interest, and in some cases, not a little impatience. There are many railway matters which seriously affect this city, and which should, and no doubt will, be placed before the Board for their consideration.

One of the most important of these is the injunction issued by the Robertson-of-Inches Estate, preventing the Chatham, Wallaceburg and Lake Erie railway from running their tracks on the southern extension, along the western side of Queen street, from Park Avenue to Indian Creek. At present the company is forced to take the centre of the road—not, however, that it is any inconvenience to them, more than that they will have to move them off the road when the authority is granted by the Commissioners, as it is sincerely hoped it will, but under present conditions it is a source of great annoyance and danger to the farmers and others coming in and going out of the city, by this route.

It seems that there has been an unfortunate mix-up in connection with this matter. Some time ago it was understood that the Commission had granted the railway permission to use the side of the road adjoining this estate. Later a judicial order was issued which placed exactly the opposite face on the matter, and here things came to a standstill. It is clearly in the interests of this city that the southern extension of this road should be completed and in running order just as soon as possible, but it is as much in those interests that the travelling public should be protected. It is hoped that the city will overlook nothing in placing this matter before the Commissioners, in its proper, and therefore, most favorable, light.

The railway accommodation on the Grand Trunk and Wabash is also of vital importance, and the establishing of a M. C. R. station in conjunction with the C. W. & L. E., to accommodate Chathamites, is also a worthy move, and one deserving of attention. One of the most im-

portant matters, however, which will come before the Commissioners during their meeting here, is the proposed establishing of gates at the C. P. R. crossings at Wellington and Centre streets. This is a question which has been frequently commented upon by The Planet, and it is felt by many that notwithstanding the frequency of these comments, the matter has not been given as much prominence and boosting as it deserves.

Everyone in the city is forced into the belief, in view of the many serious accidents and narrow escapes at these two points, that these two crossings are veritable death traps. There is absolutely no protection of any kind for the teamsters and horsemen, and even pedestrians, who are called upon to make use of these crossings. The fact that high buildings obscure the view, along the approaches to the tracks in both cases makes the danger still greater. As a result of the general complaint which has been made from time to time, the Railway committee of the City Council took the matter up, but it seems they have been unable to make much progress. Probably if the members of the Commission were given the opportunity to personally inspect these crossings, something beneficial to all concerned might result.

Secretary Landon, of the Board of Trade, touched the point when he urged the Railway committee of the Board to immediately prepare a statement of the city's stand on all of these matters to be served on the different railways concerned as soon as possible. It is necessary that these statements shall be in the hands of the railway companies at least ten days before the Commission meets, and if this regulation is to be complied with, no time should be lost by the men on that committee.

The Ontario Government has very properly warned prospectors for oil and gas off Road Bau Park. If there are any valuable deposits there they should be exploited for the benefit of the community. — Toronto Globe.
