MR. BOWYER STANDS TRUE.

It is gratifying to note that at least one member on the dominant side of the Legislature has not changed his views regarding one of the principal issues before the people of Ontario at the time of the last general election.

The speech which Mr. Bowyer delivered in the Legislature last week, and reported in this week's Sun, is precisely in line with the speeches which he delivered from the hustings in East Kent when seeking election to the Legislature. What Mr. Bowyer said in the House last week is a clear and strong declaration in favor of the equalization of taxation similar to the equalization which has already taken place in the United States, and is a complete refutation of the statement of Mr. Matheson that the fair taxation of railways across the lines has restricted railway-building over the way.

There are other members as strongly committed to the principle of equal taxation as Mr. Bowyer. Among these are Mr. Clarke, of Bruce, Mr. Downey, of Wellington, and Mr. Preston, of Durham. If these gentlemen will speak up as boldly as Mr. Bowyer has done, they will perform a service not only to the Province, but to their own party as well. By taking this course they would compel the Government to do what the Government is in honor bound to do—make taxation equal as between farmers and railway corporations; and equalization of taxation will relieve farmers from burdens now unjustly borne, and do more than anything else that could be done to strengthen the hold of the Government on the country. —Toronto Sun.

Alberta Fixes Game Law.

Regina, March 20.—In the Legislature yesterday the second reading of the bill for the protection of game was made.

The amendment of the game laws was made necessary through the rapid settlement of the country. One of the features of the bill is the prohibition of spring shooting of wild fowl.

It was approved by the convention of game guardians last year, and is generally approved of, but the Government desires to get into line with public opinion, not only in this province, but throughout the American continent.

There are also provisions for limiting the amount of a sportsman's bag to ten grouse or prairie chickens for one day and 100 for the season, and forbidding the use of dogs in hunting deer.

Salaries of Judges.

Regina, March 20.—A resolution passed in the Legislature here yesterday provides that judges shall be paid \$500 yearly as judges of Surrogate courts by the Provincial Government. A Surrogate judge will also be district judge and in that capacity will receive \$2,500 a year from the Dominion Government for first year of service, and after that \$3,000 a year.
