"Town Topics" is a title that suggests all kinds of humorous possibilities, and they are found in the farce comedy of that name that will be played at Chatham, to-morrow night. The scene opens in Mrs. Quick's boarding house. The American boarding house is familiar to most of us, and we know that there is always something to promote fun and indigestion in that interesting institution. The boarding house in "Town Topics" is a lively place and there is too much laughter for the prunes and torn beef to lie heavy on your chest. The second act takes place at the seaside, and here the husband of the presiding goddess of the boarding house meets some nice gentlemen who give him the glad hand and lead him into all kinds of scrapes. He thinks he is smart, but he is not smart enough. He meets some beautiful girls, too, and they help the fun along. They sing, they dance, and there is a rip-roaring time. In the last act we find the husband home again, and he has to settle matters with his wife. The story is straight and to the point, but it is interrupted frequently to allow of musical and terpsichorean numbers, and specialties of novel idea. These specialties all grow out of the action of the play, and are not tacked on awkwardly, as is so often the case in performance, and so happily blended.
