Rev. A. H. MacGillivray, the earnest young pastor of the First Presbyterian church, is giving a series of sermons at his morning services based upon the Lord's Prayer. The text for his sermon yesterday morning was "Hallowed Be Thy Name." Judging from the success of the first two, these sermons promise to be timely and helpful.

One of the dangers which threaten preachers, he thought, was professionalism and a temptation to preach for the money in it or to perform his message to what he believed to be the wishes of his hearers. He thought that a minister's mission was to give the plain truth and to give it continuously.

The musical portion of the service was fittingly appropriate. Two splendid anthems were given by the choir, and in the evening a duet was rendered by Misses McKellar and Peate.
