Manifesto of Peter Innes and Leander Rand.
To the Electors of Kings County:
GENTLEMEN,—It may not be possible for us to make a personal canvass, and ask each of you for your vote on April 20th, as the time is short and we are booked to address meetings in every ward in the county. In order, however, that you may know exactly how and where we stand in the present campaign we submit the following as the main planks in our platform.
REDUCTION OF EXPENSES.
The ordinary revenue of the Province last year was \$324,000, but the ordinary expenditure was \$30,000 more. We advocate a reduction of salaries, members' remuneration, and the abolition of all unnecessary offices, and expenditures, until our outlays at least correspond with our incomes. We adhere to the good old honest principle that every man, family and government should live within their incomes.
NO MORE BORROWING.
The admitted debt of the Province, all (with the exception of some \$313,000) contracted during the past 14 years, amounts to \$3,431,000, and the annual interest thereon amounts to over \$140,000, crippling to that extent the funds that ought to have been available for the ordinary public services,—notably the road and bridge grants. We advocate the closing of the capital account, for some years at least, with the exception of such aids as may be voted for approved railway extensions.
CREATION OF SINKING FUND.
We advocate the setting apart of certain definite annual amounts as a sinking fund for the gradual extinction of debt, and abolition of interest charges.
AUDIT OF ACCOUNTS.
We advocate the appointment of an Auditor-General,—a reliable and competent man, who shall be entirely independent of government and party, and whose duties, powers and functions shall be defined by statute.
This in brief is our platform. We go for honesty, efficiency and economy in every branch of the public service, and it is upon these broad and definite grounds,—grounds which are not questions of party at all, that we solicit your support on this occasion.

I wish, however, to call the attention of all right minded people throughout the county to the fact that Kentville has a far worse plague in its midst than even the terrible diphtheria, and in spite of its ravages, now long continued, the Town Council and the people generally smile complacently, and defy the efforts of outsiders to eradicate the terrible disease which is doing fearful injury in all the county. I refer to the dreadful curse of intemperance prevailing in Kentville, and fostered in neighbouring towns by the unrestricted sale of intoxicants there, without a single effort being made by the Council or the people to bring to justice those who are continually breaking the laws of our country. Kentville has long had the unsavoury title of the "Devil's Half-acre" and to its shame be it said this town seems to rejoice in the reputation it has won, and seeks, by winking at this unblushing violation of the laws, to deserve fully the unsavoury distinction it has acquired.
In Wolfville we have banished this cursed sale from our midst, but alas! our desires for peace and purity are largely defeated by the open sale of intoxicants in Kentville. Shame to those Kentville! Look at Amherst and follow her example in destroying this illegal traffic. Awake and see that this plague is far worse than diphtheria, and cleanse yourself from the stinking reputation you have justly acquired.
Let it not be said that Kentville is unable to stop this sale because the people themselves love the cursed drink and so refuse to banish it. Vox Populi.

Our Cemeteries.
DEAR SIR,—On my return from England last autumn I was both pained and annoyed to learn that cattle were being allowed to roam at large over the West Bank Cemetery, this very picturesque and peaceful resting place of our loved departed ones. I regret extremely that this state of affairs cannot be prevented, and yet it ought to be. This beautiful spot, so kindly donated by my venerable friend, J. W. Bars, Esq., should or ought to be kept like a flower garden, and forever held sacred for the purpose for which it has been solemnly dedicated. I may be told that the trustees have the power to enforce the law in this respect, but from my experience during my residence in Wolfville, I have learned that the making of laws is one thing, but the putting them in force is quite another. I fear that we have a growing element of unruly youth in Wolfville, which, if allowed to go unchecked much longer will ripen into manhood and become very hard to eradicate.
One can hardly realize that in our midst there exist people so ruthless and hard-hearted as to wrench from the cemetery gates fastenings and those protections which were placed there for security, but such has been the case. We are frequently asked to give our money to the church in the noble effort to evangelize the heathen in far away lands. It is not somewhat of a reproach that we do not do more of this kind of work at home? If I may be allowed to make a suggestion I would say that the Willow Bank cemetery and the old one on the Main street should be cared for and kept in order by the Town Council. A very small tax might be levied, to which I feel sure no citizen would object, and a caretaker appointed to see this matter carried out. The Town Council would then become the trustees, appoint-
