The British expeditionary force in India will cross the frontier with the least possible delay. Four regiments have already started up the Irrawaddy, the most heavily armed vessel in the navy for her draught (5½ feet) proceeds in advance and will go up the river as far as Bhamo. She takes up some torpedoes and a large supply of gun cotton and necessary appliances for the removal of obstructions in the bed of the river. She is accompanied by two armed launches.
