Aldobert S. Hay Killed
NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 25.—Aldobert
Stone Hay, Consul to Victoria, South Af-
rica, during the most stirring stages of the
Boer war, the oldest son of the Hon. John
Hay, secretary of state in President McKin-
ley's cabinet, and one of the younger as well
as one of the most popular Yale men, met a
tragic death in this city at 2:20 o'clock this
morning. He fell from the window of his
room on the third floor of the New Haven
house, sixty feet to the pavement. Death
was instantaneous.
LONDON, June 24.—The afternoon news-
papers voice the sincere regret universally
expressed on the death of Aldobert S. Hay,
in New Haven Saturday. All the papers
refer with emphasis to the debt Great Brit-
ain owed the late Mr. Hay for his many
kindly offices.
