Report of Inspectors Who Made a Special Investigation. Toronto, Aug. 29.—The report of the inspectors appointed by the Government to make a special investigation into horse-breeding in Ontario has been pub-lished by the Department of Agriculture and is now ready for distribution. It is largely statistical and gives at consider-able length details of the work of the commissioners in every county in the Province. Opinions gathered in inter-views with private individuals and at public meetings as to what should be done to improve the breed of horses are included. In all the counties the con-census of opinion was in favor of stallions being licensed and registered, and the inspectors in their reports favor the pass-ing of an act to that effect. In many counties the horses were not of a good class, and one cause of the deterioration of the breeds wa sheld to be the syndi-cating system of buying and dealing in so-called first-class animals for breeding purposes.
