PARK SCHEME TAKING SHAPE.

Options Secured on Much Land on Mountain Front.

Engineer Barrow Will Have Suggestions to Make.

Estimate of \$362,847 For New Road Work.

The representatives appointed by those behind the scheme for a greater parks system, to get options on land along the mountain face from below the East End Incline to west of Garth street, will report this afternoon at a meeting to be held in the Board of Trade rooms The scheme is in concise shape now, and it is expected, will be carried to a successful issue. The city, by purchasing the five acres in Chedoke ravine and ac cepting W. D. Flatt's offer, settled the question of securing the land beyond Garth street. From Garth to Queen streets options have been secured on nearly all the lots along the brow and slope of the mountain. Members of the mittee say that the owners with one or two exceptions were most generous in their dealings. It is hoped that the Brantford & Hamilton Railway will don ate the lots in its possession. One own wanted \$15,000. The committee thought this was too steep. The members say they can do without this place if necessary. From Queen to James streets will be a matter for the city to take up with the Government at any time. The idea in closing the deal for the western property at once is to save it from being built on or destroyed.

Although he will make no recommendations for any radical changes, City Engineer Barrow has some suggestions as to a better distribution of the work, which he will make to the committee appointed to investigate his department with a view to recognization. "They with a view to reorganization. "They have proven nothing against the department," Mr. Barrow said this morning, "The things that have been brought up I can and will answer." The Engineer says he does not intend doing anything in a rush. Ald. It is said on pretty good authority that there is not an alderman in the Council who would second such a metion. "Myles who would second such a motion. "Myles Hunting did not deceive me," said the Engineer this morning, referring to the remark made by Ald. Farrar, and on which the latter moved for Hunting's dismissal. "I make the said th ismissal. "I made my report on what saw, and take all the responsibility for myself," Mr. Barrow added.

Chief TenEyek, of the Fire Depart Chief Tenfyck, of the Fire Department, said this morning that the wiring of many of the electric signs on the principal streets is imperfect, and in danger of causing fire or loss of life. This, is a question that the Fire Underwriters in Toronto have insisted on the authorities taking up, and it is likely that something will be done here.

The Hamilton Radial Railway has abandoned its attempt to force an entrance into Toronto, says a despatch from there, and has agreed to insert a clause in the bill which is to come before Parliament at its next session. The City Solicitor wrote the Board of Control today that Hon. J. M. Gibson has agreed to add to the bill these words: "but shall not construct or operate its railway." to add to the bill these words: "but shall not construct or operate its railway." a along any highway." without first obtaining the consent of the municipalities and upon terms to be agreed on with such municipality." He explained that if the company's railway is a street railway it must get the consent of the municipality. This new clause is to safeguard the city in case it is a "railway and not a street railway." The city will offer no opposition to the bill.

The members of the special committee which was to have considered some scheme yesterday afternoon for permanent roads, decided to take copies of the estimates away with them and look them over carefully before tackling the question. Secretary, Brennan submitted a statement showing that \$362,847 was needed to pave the streets of which amount \$246,214 was for permanent asphalt and brick pavement and \$116,633 for other roadwork.

A deputation from the Trades and Labor Council will appear before the Fire and Water Committee at its meeting to-night, it is said, and ask for permission to inspect the filtering basins on its own behalf. Mayor Stewart said if he was asked he would refuse to grant the permission. "I have no objection," he said to-day, "to the Trades and Labor people or anyone else looking at the basins, but I do object to the Council delegating its authority to any one for that purpose.
