The impressive Rebekeh burial service was read at the graveside by Mrs. David Gulliver and Miss Rena McKenzie, and as the remains were laid to rest, the members sang, "Safe in the Arms of Jesus." Among the numerous floral offerings that adorned the casket were wreaths from Rebekeh Lodge, and Hargd and Mrs. Phillips; cut flowers from Mrs. G. B. Fraser; Robert Jessamin, Mrs. Atkinson and Miss B. Wood. Interment was at St. Mark's Cemetery, Douglstown. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family.
